

Philately on the Web: National Postal Museum — The museum is located across the street from Union Station, in the building that served as the main post office of Washington DC for decades, from its construction in 1914 until 1986.

Background: Its established through joint agreement between the United States Postal Service and the Smithsonian Institution and opened in 1993. The building was designed by the Graham and Burnham architectural firm, which was led by Ernest Graham following the death of Daniel Burnham in 1912.

In addition to the museum, the building is the headquarters of the United States Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics along with a space for a data center for the United States Senate.

The museum holds the National Philatelic Collection. It has hosted many interactive displays about the history of the United States Postal Service and of mail service around the world. The museum has a gift shop and a United States Postal Service philatelic sales window, along with exhibits on the Pony Express, the use of railroads with the mail, the preserved remains of Owney (the first unofficial postal mascot), and an exhibit on direct marketing called, "What's in the Mail for You."

Visitors may acquire a souvenir envelope with their name printed on it and a coupon for the gift shop. As one of the national Smithsonian museums, admission is free. This museum also houses one of the largest and most significant philatelic and postal history collections in the world and one of the world's most comprehensive library resources on philately and postal history. The National Postal Museum is dedicated to the preservation, study and presentation of postal history and philately through stamps and objects.

The museum uses exhibits, educational public programs and research to make this rich history available to scholars, philatelists, collectors and visitors from around the world. The National Postal Museum Library is one of 21 specialized libraries in the Smithsonian Libraries and Archives system. The National Philatelic Collection was the basis of the Library when it was established in 1993. Now, with more than 40,000 books, journals, catalogues and documents, the National Postal Museum Library is among the world's largest postal history and philatelic research facilities.

The primary items of focus include such topics as:

Current Exhibitions - The museum's galleries explore America's postal history from colonial times to the present. Visitors learn how mail has been transported and the wonder of stamps.

Virtual Exhibitions - The National Postal Museum's virtual exhibitions galleries present America's postal history from Colonial times to the present, through the unique lens of postal history and stamps.

Virtual Tour (https://postalmuseum.si.edu/virtual-tour) will give you a taste of what is available to view once the museum opens again to the public.

Search the collection - The Museum celebrates the beauty and lore of stamps. A stamp is much more than the physical evidence that postage has been paid.

Search the collection to discover philatelic and postal history objects tracing the evolution of the postal services.

For Researchers - The Museum supports a wide variety of interdisciplinary research projects which address topics of importance such as current and future postal operations, as well as philatelic and postal history. Our efforts are a resource and point of reference for research and wider investigation by historians throughout the United States and the world - a lot of which is available online or by physical checkout.

Stamp Collecting - The Museum celebrates the beauty and lore of stamps. A stamp is much more than the physical evidence that postage has been paid. Stamps can be miniature works of art, treasured keepsakes, and rare collectibles (In 2005, the museum acquired the childhood stamp collection of the late singer/songwriter John Lennon.)
