The consensus was for the hard copy — even with the reduction of issues given Amos publishing controls the magazine.



A quick guide to the United States Postal Service website — https://www.usps.com/





The **United States Postal Service (USPS)** was established on 1971 July 01 — nearly 250 years since Benjamin Franklin was appointed our first Postmaster General in 1775, the Postal Service has grown and changed with America, boldly embracing new technologies to better serve a growing population ...

One of these technologies has been the internet, first used in 1994 and assuming its present form in 2001.

The home page is divided into three primary sections, Top Menu Bar (image above) – primary interest item, a middle widow (not shown) that focuses on current happenings and events concerning the USPS and the public and the Bottom Link area (image below) that points users to lesser used functions of the site.

For the purpose of this article, we'll look at four selections that are or can be used by the stamp collector:



Quick Tools Links

Quick Tools (see image to left) has several tools useful in tracking stamp purchases: Track a Package – where you open the screen, insert tracking number and it spits back where it is lost in space. **Informed Delivery** is a service you sign up for and each morning it will send you images of item(s) that may reach your mail box that day and a means to report missing mail. Look Up a Zip Code – very useful for finding the ZIP+4 (or Zip+6) when sending out mail. Type in the street address and 5-digit ZIP code and it will return the rule-based address for the item in proper format to speed it through the shredder system.



The **Shop** link (image to the right) has two area that are of use to the stamp collector – Stamps (image below), which opens a page where you can purchase almost every stamp available in the system - its weakest area concerns coils issues and



issues that are printed by more than one company. There is a work-around that allows you to enter a "SKU" number to order a particular printers item (if you can find the proper SKU – sometimes found in LINN'S).



The Collector (image below) link will point you to items the USPS sells to the stamp collecting public – FDC's, Panels and other keepsakes. The item that can be of most use is the free quarterly **USA Philatelic Catalog** that contains more information on current and future stamps in simple form (along with some of the missing SKU numbers need for the **Shop** section).

Postal Bulletin

From the Bottom Link Area, one is able to view the US Postal Bulletins from 2001-to-current I PDF format. Prior to the 2001 site upgrade, it was from 1995 (the LCPSHOME.ORG site has the issues from 1995-current an/HTML d the THE DIGITIZED US POSTAL BULLETINS and PL&Rs (1880-2013) (http://www.uspostalbulletins.com/) contains all the earlier ones.

The **Postal Bulletins** are useful because they contain all the technical information for stamps issued/to be issued (except for perf/die cut info) – so if you need to know the printers/microprint or other info one can look to this section of the website. This section is unique to the Philatelic world in the amount of stamp information that is available for each issue — and sometimes will contain additional ordering info needed for Kansas City ...



Our fourth link, National Postal Museum (located in Washington DC) directs the user offsite to the Smithsonian National Postal Museum website. The "Search the Collection" link

allows the user to view most US issues up to and including 2010 along with a fair number of other countries including the Vatican City and Israel.

Besides just stamps, there are online exhibits on Postal History, virtual exhibits (Lunar New Year Postage Stamps, The American Indian in Postage Stamps, About Postal Operations, American Art on Postage Stamps, etc.)
