75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Stamp





Last month, the Lake County Philatelic Society marked its 95<sup>th</sup> Birthday (with a few years of random meetings from 1942-1946).

Lore states the biggest catalyst to the clubs founding was the 1933 Chicago "A Century of Progress International **Exposition**" and the USPOD issue of the Baby Zeplin(C18) stamp which caught the eyes of navy personnel stationed at the Great Lakes Naval Station and with Commander-in-Chief (President Roosevelt) interest in stamp collecting ...

Early on and up to 1950, the biggest share of membership was centered around the Great Lakes Naval Training Center. Meetings and activities moved off base in 1949 and since then migrated to Waukegan, Gurnee and Grayslake.
