Open Seasons

Open Seasons are just around the corner!

Federal Employee Health Benefits (FEHB) runs from Nov. 14 to Dec. 13 at 5:00 P.M. CT. During FEHB Open Season, employees have the opportunity to enroll or make changes to their existing plan.

Flexible Spending Account (FSA) runs from Nov. 14 to Dec. 31 at 5:00 P.M. CT. With FSA, employees can set aside money for medical and dental deductibles, co-pays and more — tax free.

Annual Leave Exchange (ALE) runs from Nov. 15 to Dec. 15 at 11:59 P.M. CT. ALE provides an option for eligible employees to receive a lump sum payment in exchange for a portion of annual leave that would otherwise be advanced at the beginning of the 2006 leave year.

And the Thrift Savings Plan? Open all year around!

When Open Seasons begin, use *PostalEASE* to make any elections. Have your employee ID and USPS PIN handy. *PostalEASE* is available at Employee Self Service kiosks, on the Postal Service Intranet and on LiteBlue, or you can use *PostalEASE* by calling 877-477-3273, (877-4PS-EASE) toll-free.

One-year EAS compensation packages developed

Pay consultations between the Postal Service and the National Association of Postmasters of the United States (NAPUS) and the National League of Postmasters (League) have concluded, resulting in a 1-year compensation package that will remain in effect through fiscal year (FY) 2006. In addition, pay consultations with the National Association of Postal Supervisors (NAPS) have concluded covering the same time frame.

Under the current Pay-for-Performance Program retained for FY 2006, postmasters and supervisors are measured on their individual contributions using a performance matrix that will make them eligible for pay increases of up to 12 percent.

Salary ranges will increase 2.25 percent for EAS 11 and above EAS postmasters and supervisors. Additional information soon will be provided to the field on the final EAS compensation package.

Headquarters/area office pay for performance extended to FY 2006

Salary ranges for Headquarters and area office EAS employees will increase 2.25 percent for EAS-11 and above, with the same pay provisions as field EAS and post-masters. The performance pay matrix remains the same as used in FY 2004 and 2005. Details will be provided to each officer shortly.

Premium Forwarding Service peak sign-up season

Leaves are falling and "snowbird" season approaches — the perfect time to sign up customers for Premium Forwarding Service (PFS).

PFS — a 2-year experiment launched in August — ships mail to residential customers who are away from their main address for 2 weeks to up to 1 year.

Connecticut District Manager Gerry Ahern used several methods to announce PFS to postmasters and station managers so they could promote it to customers as another temporary forwarding option. The Con-

necticut District has enrolled 386 customers — accounting for almost half of PFS revenue-to-date for the Northeast Area.

More than 6,900 customers nationwide have chosen PFS since its kickoff. The average customer signs up for about 7 weeks of service.

Mail delivery resumed in the French Quarter and parts of the New Orleans business district. Carriers are making street deliveries where

accessible, and over-the-counter service is available for all others.

Evacuees are reminded to file change-of-address forms for their new temporary or permanent forwarding address if they haven't already done so.

New Preparation for Periodicals Flats in Mixed Area Distribution Center Bundles and Sacks

Currently, we process and transport Periodicals flats separate from other classes of mail. Effective October 27, 2005, Periodicals mailers have a new option to create an additional bundle and sack. This option is offered to improve service for Periodicals without adding costs by processing some working (mixed ADC) flats for specified ZIP Codes ™ within a limited area around the office of entry, typically a 500- to 800-mile radius, with First-Class Mail® service. These ZIP Codes are identified using new labeling list L201. Mail for the remainder of the country is labeled according to existing labeling list L009.


Periodicals Prepared in Bundles and Sacks

Here's how the new preparation will work:

Mailers will continue to prepare Periodicals in 5-digit, 3-digit, and ADC bundles according to current standards. Mailers will divide the remaining pieces into working (mixed ADC) bundles containing pieces for destinations in L201 and working bundles labeled according to L009.

Mailers will then continue to prepare the Periodicals bundles in 5-digit, 3-digit, SCF, and ADC sacks according to current standards. After preparing all finer sort level sacks, mailers will place remaining bundles in two working (mixed ADC) sacks: one according to new labeling list L201 with an "origin mixed ADC" designation, and the other according to current labeling list L009 with a "mixed ADC" designation.

After all appropriate 5-digit, 3-digit, SCF, and ADC sacks are prepared, the remaining bundles are sacked according to the proposed mixed ADC split illustrated below:



As a note, the nature of labeling list L201 is somewhat different from other list formats. In L201 mailers must use the origin and destination of the mail to determine the appropriate bundle or sack.

Periodicals Prepared in Trays

Effective October 27, 2005, as a further option, mailers may place Automated Flat Sorting Machine (AFSM) 100-compatible mailpieces in ADC and mixed ADC flat trays with lids instead of in ADC and mixed ADC sacks. The minimum quantity per flat tray is 24 pieces of mail. Mailers must not secure mail in bundles when placed in flat trays but must group the mail together by bundle presort destinations.

Pieces must not be secured in bundles, and mailers must group together pieces for each 5-digit scheme, 5-digit, 3-digit scheme, 3-digit, and ADC destination.

- a. ADC: required (24-piece minimum); overflow tray not allowed.
 - 1. Line 1: use L004, Column B.
 - 2. Line 2: "PER" or "NEWS" as applicable, followed by "FLTS," followed by "ADC."
- b. Origin mixed ADC. No minimum for any remaining pieces for destinations of the origin ZIP Code in L201, Column C, of the origin ZIP Code in Column A. Fewer than six pieces at 5-digit, 3-digit, and ADC levels are not permitted.
 - 1. Line 1: Use L201, Column C.
 - 2. Line 2: "PER" or "NEWS" as applicable, followed by "FLTS WKG W FCM."
- c. Mixed ADC: No minimum.
 - 1. Line 1: Use L009.

Mailers may prepare only one less-than-full origin mixed sack.

20.4.2 Tray Sizes

- b. Height: 8 inches to bottom of handhold, 11-1/4 inches to top of tray.

Mailers using this option must prepare flat trays subject to these standards:

- Addresses on all pieces must face upward in the same direction.
- b. Pieces must be placed in trays to maintain their orientation (double stacks of mail are allowed). Once the required minimum volume is reached to allow or require preparation of an ADC tray, additional pieces must be placed in the same tray up to its capacity to minimize the number of trays used. Mail must not fill the tray enough to inhibit adequate closure or covering of the contents.

- c. The weight of a tray and its content must not exceed 70 pounds.
- d. Each tray must bear the correct tray label.
- e. For mailings prepared under the optional tray-based preparation in 25.4, when pieces remain after one or more full trays for an ADC destination are prepared, an additional ADC tray must be prepared if the remaining pieces reach the required volume. If the remaining volume is below the required minimum, the pieces must be moved to the appropriate origin mixed ADC or mixed ADC tray.
- f. Each flat tray must be covered with a white lid. Each covered flat tray must be secured with two straps placed tightly around the width (shorter dimension) of the tray.

- b. Origin mixed ADC: No minimum; for any remaining pieces for destinations in L201, Column C, of the origin ZIP Code in Column A.

DMM REVISION

Address Visibility on Bundles of Flat-Size and Irregular Parcel Mail

Effective October 27, 2005, the Postal Service™ is adopting new mailing standards to enhance our ability to process bundles of flat-size and irregular parcel mailpieces on our new Automated Package Processing System (APPS) equipment. APPS has optical character reader (OCR) technology that enables it to read delivery information on bundles of mail and process that mail efficiently. We are adding the new standards to *Mailing Standards of the United States Postal Service*, Domestic Mail Manual (DMM®).

Summary of the New Standards

Mailers preparing presorted bundles must have the delivery address information and any presort label or optional endorsement line on the top piece of each bundle visible and readable by the naked eye. The new standards apply only to bundles of Periodicals, Standard Mail®, and Package Services mailpieces intended for processing on APPS equipment. The new standards do not apply to:

- Letter-size mailpieces.
- First-Class Mail® flat-size pieces or parcels.
- Mail placed in or on 5-digit or 5-digit scheme sacks or pallets.
- Mail placed in carrier route or 5-digit carrier routes sacks.
- Carrier route mail entered at a destination delivery unit (DDU).
- Standard Mail flat-size pieces prepared in letter trays under DMM 345.3.4.
- Customized MarketMail® (CMM).

Recommendations

To help mailers meet the new standards, we recommend that strapping used for bundling be clear and smooth and have less than 70 percent haze in accordance with the American Society for Testing and Materials (ASTM) standard D1003. Clear, smooth strapping that is tightly secured around the bundle does not obstruct visibility. Strapping should not contain any seams or texture marks that obscure address characters. We recommend that any shrinkwrap used to secure bundles show less than 70 percent haze after shrinkage. Seams, blisters, wrinkles, or other protrusions on shrinkwrap material should not obscure addresses on the top pieces of bundles. We also recommend that any bundle with multiple layers of bundling materials show less than 70 percent haze through all combined layers.

Effective Date

We are implementing the new standards on October 27, 2005. However, we realize that the mailing industry may have to change some procedures to ensure address visibility, and we will allow a 6-month grace period for compliance. We will not assess penalties on bundles not meeting the standards until April 30, 2006.

During the grace period, acceptance employees will randomly examine bundles for address visibility. We will provide feedback to mailers at acceptance and via eMIR from destination sites. We also will work closely with mailers to improve address readability on their bundles.

Mailers preparing presort bundles must ensure that the delivery address information on the top mailpiece in each bundle is visible and readable by the naked eye. Mailers using strapping that might cover the address can avoid obstructing visibility by using clear, smooth strapping tightly secured around the bundle. Mailers using barcoded pressure-sensitive bundle labels, optional endorsement

lines, carrier route information lines, or carrier route facing slips also must ensure that the information in these presort designations is visible and readable by the naked eye. This standard does not apply to the following:

- a. Customized MarketMail.
- b. Bundles placed in or on 5-digit or 5-digit scheme (L001) sacks or pallets.
- Bundles placed in carrier route and 5-digit carrier routes sacks.
- d. Bundles of mailpieces at carrier route rates entered at a destination delivery unit (DDU).
- e. Bundles of Standard Mail flat-size pieces prepared in letter trays under 345.3.4.

ELM REVISION

Sick Leave for Dependent Care

Effective October 27, 2005, Employee and Labor Relations Manual (ELM) 513.1, Purpose, and 513.32, Conditions for Authorization, are revised to differentiate sick leave taken for employee incapacitation from sick leave taken for dependent care, and then to clarify that leave taken for care of a qualifying family member, after a maximum of 80 hours of sick leave, will be charged to annual leave, or to leave without pay, at the employee's option.

513 Sick Leave

513.1 Purpose

[Revise 513.1 to read as follows:]

513.11 Sick Leave for Employee Incapacitation

Sick leave insures employees against loss of pay if they are incapacitated for the performance of duties because of illness, injury, pregnancy and confinement, and medical (including dental or optical) examination or treatment.

513.12 Sick Leave for Dependent Care

A limited amount of sick leave may also be used to provide for the medical needs of a family member. Nonbargaining unit employees, and bargaining unit employees if provided in their national agreements, are allowed to take up to 80 hours of their accrued sick leave per leave year to give care or otherwise attend to a family member (as defined in 515.2) with an illness, injury, or other condition that, if an employee had such a condition, would justify the use of sick leave. If leave for dependent care is approved, but the employee has already used the maximum 80 hours of sick leave allowable, the difference is charged to annual leave or to LWOP at the employee's option. (See 515 for information about FMLA entitlement to be absent from work.)

Recrediting Sick Leave Upon Reemployment

Effective October 27, 2005, *Employee and Labor Relations Manual* (ELM) 513.72, Reemployment, is revised to clarify that sick leave cannot be recredited when an employee takes a new position that does not provide sick leave.

Employee and Labor Relations Manual (ELM)

513.72 Reemployment

[Revise 513.72 to read as follows:]

Sick leave may be recredited upon reemployment provided there is not a break in service in excess of 3 years.

Note: For sick leave to be recredited, the employee must be reemployed in a position where sick leave may be earned and used.

Rural Carrier Guarantee Period

Postal Service™ managers must effectively manage rural carriers who work under the provisions of the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) section 7(b)(2). These carriers are paid overtime for all hours actually worked in excess of 2,080, up to 2,240, within the 52-consecutive-week guarantee period.

If a carrier works more than 2,240 hours within the guarantee period, the agreement under FLSA, section 7(b)(2), is considered void, and the carrier must be compensated for all hours worked during the guarantee period in accordance with FLSA, section 7(a).

It is important that we make every effort to minimize the number of hours carriers work over 2,080 and strictly monitor these carriers to ensure that no carrier works in excess of 2,240 actual work hours.

Last year's guarantee period was from Saturday, October 30, 2004, through Friday, October 28, 2005. The guarantee period for this year runs from Saturday, October 29, 2005, through Friday, October 27, 2006.

Fiscal Year 2006 Safety and Health Inspection Instructions

Effective immediately, as set forth in the policy letter on the following page (see Exhibit 1), new procedures are established for the inspection of facilities with less than 100 work years of employment.

The Employee Labor Relations Manual (ELM), 824.331, requires your Facility Safety Coordinator (FSC) to conduct an annual Safety and Health Inspection of your facility. The FSC should lead the inspection team (ELM 824.332). The PC/District Safety staff members will provide technical assistance to you on request. You must take the following actions:

- Complete the inspection using the hardcopy checklists from the Safety Resources Web page or enter the inspection findings into the Safety Toolkit Web application no later than February 28, 2006.
- Use the safety and health inspection checklists that correspond to the number of work years at your facility. The inspection checklists are available on the Safety Resources Web page or in the Safety Toolkit Web application.

One union representative from the local safety and health committee may participate in the annual inspection of each installation with less than 100 work years of employment in the regular workforce where the committee exists in the installation being inspected. In those installations that do not have a safety and health committee, the inspectors afford the opportunity for a bargaining unit employee (from each union that represents employees in that installation) to accompany them during these inspections. If requested, these bargaining unit employees should be selected on a rotational basis by the various exclusive bargaining representatives in that installation (ELM 824.332).

When you have completed the inspection you must:

 Provide a copy of the inspection report to the employee representative(s) and post a copy for employee review (ELM 824.426).

- Establish a Hazard Abatement Committee within 5 working days of receipt of the inspection and meet to assign priorities and specific abatement dates within the limits set by the inspection team (ELM 824.52).
- 3. Notify the supporting Safety manager that the inspection has been performed by sending the manager a copy of the Safety and Health Inspection Certification Letter (see Exhibit 2 on page 45) before February 28, 2006. The FSCs that enter the inspection findings into the Safety Toolkit are not required to complete the Safety and Health Inspection Certification Letter.
- Correct the serious deficiencies first, and all deficiencies as soon as possible. Keep records of the corrections of deficiencies in hardcopy or enter the correction dates (abatement dates) into the Safety Toolkit.
 - If you can't correct the deficiencies in 20 days, prepare a Hazard Abatement Plan (HAP) and forward the plan to the district manager. Provide a copy of the plan to your supporting PC/District/Safety Office (ELM 824.532). The Safety Toolkit provides the HAP template for those inspections entered into the Safety Toolkit. The HAP can be completed in the Safety Toolkit, which will then produce the required HAP report.
 - If you can't correct the deficiencies in 45 days, forward a copy of the HAP through management channels to the Vice President, Area Operations, with copies to the area Human Resources manager and PC/District Safety Office (ELM 824.533).

SUBJECT: Safety and Health Inspections

Safety Performance Management is modifying the procedures used to ensure that all facilities with less than 100 work years of employment in the regular workforce are inspected annually. This policy letter establishes the new procedures.

The Employee and Labor Relations Manual (ELM), 824.331, requires the collateral duty Facility Safety Coordinators (FSCs) to conduct annual safety and health inspections of each facility with less than 100 work years of employment in the regular workforce. The FSC must:

- Perform the inspection following the instructions in "Fiscal Year 2006 Safety and Health Inspection Instructions."
- Use the safety and health inspection checklists that correspond to the number of work years at the facility. The inspection checklists are available on the Safety Resources Web page or in the Safety Toolkit Web application.
- Complete the inspection using the hardcopy checklists (which also serve as the inspection report) from the Safety Resources Web page and submit the certification letter to your safety office no later than February 28, 2006. You may enter the inspection findings into the Safety Toolkit Web application instead of completing the inspection report in hardcopy. If you enter the inspection into the Safety Toolkit, record abatement of deficiencies in the Safety Toolkit.

The supporting Safety office will provide technical assistance, as needed, and will provide copies of the checklists to those FSCs that do not have access to a computer and the Safety Resources Web page. FSCs are encouraged to enter inspection findings into the Safety Toolkit.

You should claim the \$6.00 daily rate by submitting PS Form 1164-A, Claim for Reimbursement for Postal Supervisors, to the Scanning and Imaging Center.

Odometer readings are not required on the respective claim forms; the integrity of the claim is the responsibility of the traveler. However, should the approving official have reason to question the claim, the claimant must provide evidence that supports the claim of distance traveled.

An increase in travel reimbursement for meals and incidentals (M&I) is authorized for Postal Service[™] employees on regular travel providing hurricane recovery and relief support in the affected areas of Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Texas.

The policy is effective in accordance with the dates of the presidential declaration, as specified in the table below.

A modified per diem rate due to	is effective	for these states
Hurricane Katrina	August 29, 2005, through March 1, 2006	Alabama, Louisiana, and Mississippi
Hurricane Rita	September 24, 2005, through March 1, 2006	Texas

The traveler will receive the per diem rate of the hurricane-affected locality. The traveler may alternatively report actual expenses incurred over the M&I per diem locality rate. In other words, the traveler has the option of claiming the greater of either the per diem rate or actual costs incurred for meals and incidentals up to three times the applicable per diem rate (i.e., $3 \times $59 = 177 for New Orleans). Receipts for purchases of \$50 or more actual expenses not charged to the company card will be required. The Postal Service will audit all vouchers for those affected employees. Managers must e-mail traveler's names to National Accounting. For identification purposes, name expense reports using the employee's first initial, last name, purpose (hurricane relief), and travel dates (e.g., JDoe: Hurricane Relief: 10/3-7/05).

The increase is to help cover the high cost of meals for our Postal Service employees traveling in the disaster areas.

Elimination of Local Trust Accounts for New Express Mail Corporate Accounts

As part of the Postal Service's™ ongoing mission to help grow revenue in a competitive market by making it easier for customers to do business with us, increase efficiencies, enhance financial controls, and reduce costs, the Postal Service is eliminating local trust accounts for Express Mail Corporate Account (EMCA) customers. Effective October 1, 2005, no new EMCA local trust accounts may be opened.

Customers who would like to open a new EMCA account should call 800-STAMP-24 (800-782-6724) for an application.

New EMCA customers may use one of two electronic payment methods to fund their accounts. The electronic payment methods are as follows:

- Credit card payment. With this payment option, the customer's card is charged when the Express Mail® account is used for a mailing.
- Automated Clearing House (ACH) payment through the Centralized Automated Processing System

(CAPS). With the ACH option, a debit is sent to the account holder's bank account of choice at the time of the mailing.

These payment options not only increase convenience to our customers, but also make Express Mail service more competitive in the marketplace. By using an electronic payment option, customers will no longer have to go to a Post Office ™ to make deposits into their EMCA trust accounts in order to use Express Mail service. In addition to providing increased convenience for our customers, this new payment option also enhances financial control by reducing risk and eliminating the administrative costs of pursuing negative balance or delinquent EMCA accounts.

Existing EMCA customers will be transitioned to electronic payment methods during the next year. Corporate Treasury, Finance, will publish details of this effort in future *Postal Bulletin* articles.

Postal Customer Council Program Funds

Effective November 1, 2005, Postal Service™ trust accounts are no longer authorized for use for Postal Customer Council (PCC) funds. PCC dues (e.g., membership, registration, and meeting fees), contributions, and donations must be managed by a designated PCC treasurer in a PCC bank account, separate from trust accounts. There-

fore, payment for dues, contributions, and donations must be mailed to the local designated PCC treasurer to be deposited into the PCC bank account.

2006 Social Security and Medicare Tax Withholding

For 2006, the maximum limit on earnings for withholding in the Old-Age, Survivors, and Disability (OASDI) portion of the Social Security tax increases from \$90,000 to \$94,200. This is a \$4,200 increase from the 2005 limit. The Social Security tax rate remains at 6.2 percent, resulting in a maximum Social Security tax of \$5,840.40. This is a \$260.40 increase from the 2005 limit of \$5,580.00. There is still no limit on the amount of earnings subject to the Medicare portion of the tax rate. The Medicare tax rate applies to all taxable wages, and remains at 1.45 percent. The Federal Insurance Contribution Act (FICA) tax rate, which is the combined Social Security tax rate of 6.2 percent and the Medicare tax rate of 1.45 percent, remains at 7.65 percent for 2006.

New Hazardous Materials Management Instruction

The Postal Service ™ is committed to providing a safe workplace for its employees and providing for the safety of the general public and transportation infrastructure through the responsible management of hazardous materials and nonmailable items in the mail.

To help accomplish this, Network Operations Management recently issued Management Instruction (MI) DM-601-05-1, Hazardous Materials Acceptance and Handling.

This MI consolidates previously issued Postal Service policy and procedures for the acceptance, handling, processing, and transportation of mail containing hazardous materials throughout the Postal Service. The MI also identifies policy and procedures for the handling of nonmailable items found in the mail after acceptance.

The policies and guidelines in this MI apply to all employees at all locations where mail is accepted, handled,

processed, and delivered. These procedures may not be altered for local implementation. This MI does not include policy and procedures for hazardous materials releases or suspicious and unknown powders or substances.

FAST Enhancements Released October 23, 2005

Facility Access and Shipment Tracking (FAST) was updated on October 23, 2005, to incorporate many new enhancements. Now, if a facility requests a change to an appointment, the facility will have the ability to schedule, update, or cancel an appointment 1 hour before the appointment time (previously, 8 hours). In addition, many user interfaces now have new features including the ability to input all appointment content onto one page.

FAST Response to Hurricane Katrina

Due to Hurricane Katrina, the activation dates for the facilities in the New Orleans Area have been moved indefinitely. The facilities include Houma, Mandeville, Lafayette, Lake Charles, Baton Rouge, Shreveport, Monroe, and Alexandria. Our thoughts are with those affected by this disaster.

FAST National Deployment Status

FAST is now active in the NY Metro, Northeast, Eastern, Pacific, Southwest, Western Capital Metro, and Great Lakes Areas. Deployment to the Southeast Area commences on October 31. The first phase of FAST national deployment ends November 21, 2005.

Because the name of a facility does not always match that facility's location (city), we made searching FAST by city easier by adding a new column titled, "City Name" to the national deployment schedule.

As the team deploys in new areas, the team adjusts the national deployment schedule (e.g., facilities are added and removed and drop site keys are modified) based on a facility's previous use of the Drop Shipment Appointment System. The deployment schedule is updated weekly on RIBBS; go to http://ribbs.usps.gov and click on FAST/Surface Visibility.

FAST Password Change Required Every 180 Days

Please note that FAST has now been live for over 3 months. In compliance with Postal Service security

guidelines, all FAST customers must change their password every 180 days. Please note that cutomers will be unable to access FAST if they have not completed this task and should contact the *PostalOne!* Customer Care Center at 800-511-9085 or e-mail at *postalone@email.usps.gov* immediately if this happens.

Customer Training

The FAST team held the last training session in Louis-ville, Kentucky, on October 6. Employees interested in having additional training sessions should send an e-mail to FAST Training@usps.gov.

FAST ID Information

To use FAST, mailers, including those who make appointments by telephone, *must* register for a FAST ID through *PostalOne!* at *www.usps.com/postalone*. Customers who already have a *PostalOne!* account and need access to FAST must register by calling the *PostalOne!* Customer Care Center at 800-522-9085. Detailed instructions on the *FAST/PostalOne!* registration process are available on RIBBS. Once a facility starts scheduling appointments in FAST, it will need a FAST ID to make drop shipments.

Customers must also logon to FAST within 7 days of receiving their IDs. FAST IDs that are not used within 7 days of issue will become inactive and will require a call to the *PostalOne!* help desk for activation.

Recurring Appointment Submission

All drop shippers who currently have recurring appointments *must* reapply using PS Form 6241, *Recurring Appointment Request*, available at *http://www.usps.com/forms/allforms.htm*; click on *PS Form 6241*. To submit a request, the customer must first have a scheduler ID. It is recommended that recurring appointment requests be submitted to the Postal Service [™] 3 weeks before the facility's scheduling start date. FAST deployment schedule posted on RIBBS shows the recommended due dates for recurring appointment request submissions.

Note: Mail order catalogs are prohibited as SAM or PAL mail.

- **A.** Securities, currency, or precious metals in their raw, unmanufactured state are prohibited. Official shipments are exempt from this restriction.
- A1. Mail addressed to "Any Servicemember," or similar wording such as "Any Soldier," "Sailor," "Airman," or "Marine"; "Military Mail"; etc., is prohibited. Mail must be addressed to an individual or job title such as "Commander," "Commanding Officer," etc.
- **B.** PS Form 2976-A is required for all mail weighing 16 ounces or more, with exceptions noted below. In addition, mailers must properly complete required customs documentation when mailing any potentially dutiable mail addressed to an APO or FPO regardless of weight. The following are exceptions to the requirement for customs documentation on nondutiable mail that weighs 16 ounces or more:
 - Known mailers are exempt from providing customs documentation on non-dutiable letters, and printed matter weighing 16 ounces or more. (A known mailer is anyone who legally applies a permit imprint to a mailpiece. Mail with meter postage is not considered to be from a known mailer.)
 - All federal, state, and local government agencies are exempt from providing customs documentation on mail addressed to an APO or FPO, except for those APOs/FPOs to which restriction B2 applies.
 - Prepaid mail from military contractors is exempt, providing the mailpiece is endorsed "Contents for Official Use — Exempt from Customs Requirements."
- **B1.** PS Form 2976 or 2976-A is required. Articles are liable for customs duty and/or purchase tax unless they are bona fide gifts intended for use by military personnel or their dependents. When the contents of a parcel meet these requirements, the mailer must endorse the customs form, "Certified to be a bona fide gift, personal effects, or items for personal use of military personnel and dependents," under the heading, Description of Contents. **Exceptions:** All other exceptions listed in restriction B above are applicable to this restriction.
- **B2.** All federal, state, and local government agencies must complete customs documentation when sending mail addressed to or from this APO or FPO weighing 16 ounces or more.
 - C. Cigarettes and other tobacco products are prohibited.
- C1. Obscene articles, prints, paintings, cards, films, videotapes, etc., and horror comics and matrices are prohibited.
 - D. Coffee is prohibited.
- E1. Medicines or vaccines not conforming to French laws are prohibited.
- **E2.** Any matter depicting nude or seminude persons, pornographic or sexual items, or nonauthorized political materials is prohibited. Although religious materials contrary to the Islamic faith are prohibited in bulk quantities, items for the personal use of the addressee are permissible.
- **E3.** Radio transceivers, cordless telephones, global positioning systems, scanners, base stations, and handheld transmitters are prohibited.
- **F.** Firearms of any type are prohibited in all classes of mail. See definitions of firearms in DMM 601.11.1.2c. This restriction does not apply to firearms mailed to or by official U.S. government agencies. The restriction for mail to this APO/FPO ZIP Code does not apply to firearms mailed from this APO/FPO ZIP Code, provided ATF and USPS regulations are met. Antique firearms are a separate category defined in DMM 601.11.2 and ATF regulations; they do not require an ATF form.
- F1. Privately owned weapons addressed to an individual are prohibited in any class of mail.

- **F2.** Importation of firearms is restricted to one shotgun and one single shot .22 caliber rifle per individual.
- $\textbf{G.}\,$ Only First-Class Mail letters, Periodicals, and Standard Mail items are authorized.
- **H.** Meats, including preserved meats, whether hermetically sealed or not, are prohibited.
 - **H1.** Pork or pork by-products are prohibited.
- $\mbox{\bf I.}$ Mail of all classes must fit in a mail sack. Mail may not exceed the following dimensions:

- **I2.** This restriction does not apply to official government mail marked MOM.
 - J. Parcels may not exceed 108 inches in length and girth combined.
- K. Mail that includes in the address the words, "Dependent Mail Section," may consist only of letter mail, newspapers, magazines, and books. No parcel of any class containing any other matter may be mailed to the Dependent Mail section. This restriction does not apply if the address does not include the words "Dependent Mail Section."
 - L. All official mail is prohibited.
 - M. Fruits, animals, and living plants are prohibited.
 - N. Registered mail is prohibited.
- O. Personal mail addressed to vessels using this number is limited to unregistered First-Class Mail items and certified mail. Other classes of mail are prohibited.
 - P. APO is used for the receipt and dispatch of official mail only.
- **Q.** Mail may not exceed 66 pounds, and size is limited to 42 inches maximum length and 72 inches maximum length and girth combined.
- **R.** All alcoholic beverages, including those mailable under DMM 601.8.0, are prohibited.
- $\bf R1.$ Materials used in the production of alcoholic beverages (i.e., distilling material, hops, malts, yeast, etc.) are prohibited.
- **T.** Mailings of case lots of food and supplemental household shipments must be approved by the sender's parent agency prior to mailing.
- U. Parcels must weigh less than 16 ounces when addressed to Box R. This restriction does not apply to mail endorsed "Free Matter for the Blind or Handicapped."
- **U1.** Mail is limited to First-Class Mail weighing 13 ounces or less when addressed to Box R. This restriction does not apply to mail endorsed "Free Matter for the Blind or Handicapped." Videotapes are prohibited when addressed to Box R, regardless of weight.
- $\mbox{\bf U2.}$ Mail is limited to First-Class Mail letters only when addressed to Box R.
- **U3.** Mail is limited to First-Class Mail correspondence (including voice and video cassettes), newspapers, magazines, photographs, not exceeding 16 ounces, when addressed to Box R.
 - V. Express Mail Military Service (EMMS) not available from any origin.
- W. Meat products, such as dried beef, salami, and sausage, may be mailed, provided they remain in their original, hermetically sealed packages and bear USDA certification. Other meats, bones, skin, hair, feathers, horns or hoofs of hoofed animals, wool samples, tobacco leaves, including chewing and pipe tobacco, snuff, cigars, and cigarettes, or obscene material, including obscene drawings, photographs, films, and carvings, are prohibited. Exception: 200 grams of tobacco per parcel are permitted duty free.
- X. Personal mail is limited to First-Class Mail items (to include audio cassettes and voice tapes) weighing 13 ounces or less. This limitation does not apply to official mail.
- Y. Mail is limited to First-Class and Priority Mail items only. All Periodicals, Standard Mail items, and Package Services items (including SAM and PAL) are not authorized. This restriction also applies to official mail.
 - Z. No outside pieces (OSPs).
- **Z1.** The following restriction is applicable only to International Service Centers (ISC)/Exchange Offices. An Anti-Pilferage Seal (Item No O817E or O818A) is required on all pouches and sacks.

This new option offers customers the ability to pay and print international labels with customs forms online through a single transaction. This international shipping option is available for Global Express Mail® (GEM®), Global Priority Mail® (GPM), and Global Airmail® parcel post (GAPP) items. This kit contains the following materials:

Briefing Article

Beginning November 2, 2005, Postal Service customers will have the ability to pay postage and print GPM and GAPP labels online through a single transaction on the Click-N-Ship Web site at usps.com/clicknship.

These new international online shipping labels combine mailing information with customs forms, thereby eliminating the need for a separate customs form (either PS Form 2976, *Customs Declaration CN 22 — Sender's Declaration* (green label), or PS Form 2976-A, *Customs Declaration and Dispatch Note — CP 72*).



- No Guess Work: When customers fill in their shipping information, they are directed to use the correct online customs form for their mailpiece.
- Professional Appearance: Customs forms printed online look more professional than handwritten forms.
- Free Supplies: GPM boxes and flat-rate envelopes are available at no additional cost from Post Office[™] facilities or can be ordered online at usps.com/ international supplies.

■ Flat-Rate Shipping Option: Customers using the flatrate shipping option can ship up to 4 pounds to Canada and Mexico for \$7, and to all other applicable destination countries for \$9. (Customers must use the GPM large flat-rate envelope when using the flatrate shipping option.)

Getting started is easy. Customers need only the following items:

- PS Form 2976-E, Customs Declaration Envelope CP 91. Customers must use this Postal Service customs form envelope with each shipment.
- Postal Service—approved shipping supplies. Customers using the flat-rate shipping option must use the GPM large flat-rate envelope. For customers using the GPM variable-weight shipping option, the Postal Service recommends that they use GPM mailing stickers.

Frequently Asked Questions

1. Can customers print international shipping labels and customs forms online?

Yes. Beginning November 2, 2005, customers can print GPM and GAPP shipping labels containing customs forms online through the Click-N-Ship Web site at *usps.com/clicknship*. Customers can already print GEM shipping labels from the Click-N-Ship Web site.

2. Can insurance be purchased online for international postage?

No. Insurance cannot be purchased online, but it can be purchased at a Post Office for GEM and GAPP items.

- 3. Is "stealth" postage available for international postage? No. The postage value is a required field.
- 4. Can customers print and pay for Global Express Guaranteed® (GXG ™) postage online?

Yes. Customers can purchase GXG shipping labels from the Click-N-Ship Web site at *usps.com/clicknship*.

5. Can adhesive or thermal labels be used with international labels?

No. International labels should be printed on standard paper. Once printed, the labels need to be either cut or folded and then placed inside the Postal Service's adhesive customs envelope (PS Form 2976-E), which must be attached to the parcel.

6. Can customers use Carrier Pickup service when printing international shipping labels?

Yes. Customers can schedule Carrier Pickup service with any of the international services available through usps.com/carrierpickup.

7. Can customers print international shipping labels without postage?

International shipping labels created and printed through the Click-N-Ship Web site have the option of either showing or not showing postage.

8. Will customers need to fill out and attach a customs form when they purchase international postage online?

No. Each international shipping label created from the Click-N-Ship Web site meets mailing label and customs form requirements with a single form.

9. Where can customers get the customs form envelopes that are required for use with international packages?

Customers can order PS Forms 2976-E at no additional cost online at *usps.com/internationalsupplies* or can pick them up at a Post Office.

10. Why do customers need to fill out customs forms when they ship parcels internationally?

International mail is subject to Customs examination in the country of destination. All online international shipping labels will contain the required customs form.

11. Can customers use a Priority Mail® envelope to send a GPM item?

No. Customers can pay flat-rate postage by using the Postal Service-provided large flat-rate GPM envelope, or they can elect to pay variable-weight postage by affixing a

GPM sticker to their own envelope, box, or other packaging.

Note: The Postal Service will not accept a GPM item in a Priority Mail envelope. If a GPM item is placed in a Priority Mail envelope and deposited in a collection box, the Postal Service will return the piece to the sender.

12. Do customers need to use Postal Service packaging to mail their international items?

It is recommended that customers use Postal Service packaging or stickers to clearly indicate the type of service they have purchased. Free GEM and GPM supplies can be ordered online at *usps.com/internationalsupplies*.

13. How should customers attach international online shipping labels to a package?

For GEM and GAPP services, customers should do the following:

- If using Carrier Pickup online notification, the customer should place copies of the online shipping label inside the customs envelope (PS Form 2976-E) and retain the sender's copy.
- If depositing items at a Post Office, the customer should place all five copies of the online shipping label inside the customs envelope (PS Form 2976-E). At the Post Office, the sales and service associate (SSA) completes the rest of the label, retains the Post Office copy, and gives the sender's copy to the customer.

For GPM service, customers should do the following:

 The customer should place copies of the online shipping label inside the customs envelope (PS Form 2976-E) and retain the sender's copy.



2005 Commemorative Stamp Yearbook



The 2005 Commemorative Stamp Yearbook, Item 990500, will soon be available for sale as follows:

- At Post Offices[™].
- At postal retail stores.
- At philatelic centers.
- By mail.
- By telephone.
- By Internet order from Stamp Fulfillment Services.

To obtain an initial supply of the 2005 Commemorative Stamp Yearbook, Post Offices must immediately order Item 990500 from their designated stamp distribution office (SDO) using a separate PS Form 17, Stamp Requisition/Stamp Return. SDOs must not distribute the 2005 yearbook to Post Offices before November 4, 2005. All locations may place the 2005 Commemorative Stamp Yearbook on sale November 10, 2005, or as soon thereafter as initial quantities are received.

The yearbook is a 64-page hardbound book that includes 139 commemorative stamps with mounts and sells for \$64.95. The 139 commemorative stamps have a combined postage value of \$51.43.

The beautifully illustrated book contains colorful pictures and text about the following stamps:

- Spring Flowers.
- American Advances in Aviation.
- The Art of Disney: Celebration.
- Let's Dance/Bailemos.
- Nineteen other subjects celebrated on 2005 commemorative stamps.

The yearbooks and stamp packets are being shipped to SDOs separately by different suppliers.

HarperCollins Publishers is shipping the yearbooks to SDOs. Shipments are in master cartons of 15 books.

Minnesota Diversified Industries is shipping the stamp packets to SDOs. Distributions are scheduled to begin on October 25, 2005, and to be completed by October 29, 2005. All SDOs must verify receipt of the quantities of stamp packets, as recorded on their Advice of Shipment/ Stamp Invoice, and those actually received. SDOs should also verify that they have received equal quantities of books and stamp packets.

The stamp packets will be banded in bundles of 15 and shipped to SDOs in master cartons of 150 packets. Partial cartons will be used for shipments not in multiples of 150.

Offices must report all sales of Item 990500, 2005 Commemorative Stamp Yearbook, in AIC 092, Philatelic Product Sales.

For the sixth year, in partnership with HarperCollins Publishers, the yearbook, as well as the 32nd edition of *The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps*, will be available in bookstores and other retail outlets where books are purchased.

The new 32nd edition of *The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps*, Item 890500, soon will be available for sale as follows:

- At all Post Offices[™].
- At postal retail stores.
- At philatelic centers.
- By mail.
- By telephone.
- By Internet order from Stamp Fullfillment Services.

To obtain the initial supply for your Post Office, immediately order Item 890500 from your designated stamp distribution office (SDO) using a separate PS Form 17, *Stamp Requisition/Stamp Return*. All locations may place the new edition of the guide on sale as soon as initial quantities are received.

This edition of *The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps* has been redesigned for ease of use and to accommodate more subjects of interest to collectors. The new guide, priced at \$19.95, is still a full-color design and now is larger (8 and 1/8 inches by 10 inches) and has a comb-bound spine (similar to spiral, but plastic) so that the guide lies flat.

With this new format, we have reduced the number of pages from 575 in last year's edition to 336 pages in this year's edition. Plus, we have re-introduced the following sections that had previously been removed:

- Special Delivery Stamps.
- Registration and Certified Mail Stamps.
- Postage Due Stamps.

- Parcel Post[®].
- Special Handling.

We also have added a new section, U.S. Postal Service Listing of Stamp Series. This section lists all the stamps in each series starting with the 1869 First Pictorial Series to our various ongoing series — a total of 66 series titles. HarperCollins Publishers is now shipping the guides to SDOs. Shipments are in master cartons of 20 guides.

Promotional copies of the guide *will not* be distributed. You can now display the guide in your Post Office by simply removing a copy from your inventory for promotional use. Follow the procedures outlined in Handbook F-1, Section 428.8, Obtaining Stock for Promotions or Presentations.

Offices must report all sales of Item 890500, 32nd Edition, *The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps*, in AIC 092, Philatelic Product Sales.

For the sixth year, in partnership with HarperCollins Publishers, the guide, as well as the *2005 Commemorative Stamp Yearbook*, will be available in bookstores and other retail outlets where books are purchased.

The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps, 31st Edition (Last Year's Edition)

As the 32nd edition of *The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps* becomes available, Post Offices must withhold all remaining copies of the 31st edition (Item 890400) from sale and take the following actions:

- Retail Outlets. Collect any copies of the 31st edition of the guide from stamp credits. Immediately return them to main stock using PS Form 17.
- 2. Post Offices. Consolidate all remaining copies of the 31st edition of the guide, if any, into the unit reserve stock. Prepare all 31st editions of the guide in accordance with procedures established for disposing of obsolete and redeemed stock, and submit according to local district quarterly stamp destruction or return schedules.
- Local Office Philatelic Programs. Submit PS Form 17 to the local SDO and Stamp Services Center for the number of 31st editions of the guide needed for philatelic/promotional programs. You may give one or

- more copies to local schools, libraries, student groups, stamp clubs, and retirement homes.
- 4. SDOs. Stamp all copies of the guide used in promoting philatelic programs "NOT FOR RESALE." The SDO custodian of accountable paper must attest that each item is so stamped and prepare PS Form 3238, Stamps and Stamped Paper Destruction Certificate, endorsed "PHILATELIC PRODUCTS GIVEN TO PHILATELIC PROGRAMS." Program coordinators must acknowledge receipt of Item 890400 and be responsible for its control.

Note: The instructions for providing obsolete editions of the guide for philatelic and promotional purposes are an exception to general guidelines for destruction of accountable items, especially regarding obsolete (withdrawn from sale) items. In this instance, it is Postal Service™ policy not to destroy copies of the

previous year's edition of the guide when they can be used for valid promotional and/or educational purposes.

Disposition of Excess Guides

Dispose of all remaining copies of the 31st edition of *The Postal Service Guide to U.S. Stamps* (Item 890400) in accordance with Subchapter 45, Destroying Stamp Stock, of Handbook F-1. Because disposition instructions are issued annually for past issues of the guide, your office should have only the 32nd edition in inventory after completing the above procedures. If previous editions are on hand, dispose of them immediately, in accordance with subchapter 45.

Pictorial Postmarks Announcement

As a community service, the Postal Service™ offers pictorial postmarks to commemorate local events celebrated in communities throughout the nation. A list of events for which pictorial postmarks are authorized appears below. If available, the sponsor of the pictorial postmark appears in italics under the date. Also provided, as space permits, are illustrations of those postmarks that were reproducible and available at press time.

People attending these local events may obtain the postmark in person at the temporary Post Office $^{\mathbb{M}}$ station established there. Those who cannot attend the event, but who wish to obtain the postmark, may submit a mail order request. Pictorial postmarks are available only for the dates indicated, and requests must be postmarked no later than 30 days following the requested pictorial postmark date.

All requests must include a stamped envelope or postcard bearing at least the minimum First-Class Mail® postage. Items submitted for postmark may not include

postage issued after the date of the requested postmark. Such items will be returned unserviced.

Customers wishing to obtain a postmark should affix stamps to any envelope or postcard of their choice, address the envelope or postcard to themselves or others, insert a card of postcard thickness in envelopes for sturdiness, and tuck in the flap. Place the envelope or postcard in a larger envelope and address it to: PICTORIAL POST-MARKS, followed by the NAME OF THE STATION, ADDRESS, CITY, STATE, ZIP+4® CODE, exactly as listed below (using all capitals and no punctuation, except the hyphen in the ZIP+4 code).

Customers can also send stamped envelopes and postcards without addresses for postmark, as long as they supply a larger envelope with adequate postage and their return address. After applying the pictorial postmark, the Postal Service returns the items (with or without addresses) under addressed protective cover.
