Snowbird spotting: "Snowbird Mail Patrol" catches errant packages

Ending informal "snowbird" forwarding agreements is one of the key components of Premium Forwarding Service's (PFS) two-year test period. And for good reason — we can't accurately measure the success of this service if offices offer something similar for free.

When the program went into effect in August, any prior agreements to forward mail in a manner similar to what PFS does — a weekly shipment of mail inside Priority Mail packaging — were to be discontinued.

In Fort Myers and Cape Coral, FL, letter carriers take their revenue protection responsibility seriously. Ever since they learned about Premium Forwarding Service — and its additional revenue potential — they voluntarily formed a "Snowbird Mail Patrol" and discovered more than 88 ZIP Codes sending down unauthorized snowbird mail packages. The offices have been contacted and reminded to end their own version of snowbird mail forwarding and offer PFS to customers.

Setting the Record Straight: Costs not the reason for price increase

“Baloney!” was what came to mind when Public Affairs and Communications Vice President Azeezaly Jaffer read the opinion piece in a recent *Christian Science Monitor* titled “Instead of Raising Stamp Prices, the USPS Should Cut Costs.” Author Sam Ryan — a frequent critic of USPS — suggested that the recent price increase is related to postal costs.

Jaffer’s letter to the editor stated the facts. USPS has reduced its costs by a stunning \$5 billion during the last three years, and the 5.4 percent rate increase had nothing to do with postal costs. The increase resulted from the federal mandate requiring USPS to establish a \$3.1 billion escrow account.

Jaffer said, “Congress has had this topic under discussion for the last 10 years and has never entertained any of the suggestions advanced by Mr. Ryan. The column did not merit a place on the Monitor’s editorial pages.”

Boise earns a star: First under new OSHA Corporate Voluntary Protection Program

Add the Boise, ID, Processing and Distribution Center (PDC) to the growing list of USPS facilities that have earned the Occupational Safety and Health Administration’s (OSHA) Voluntary Protection Program (VPP) Star status. The award was recently presented to the facility to recognize its commitment to employee safety.

“The Boise Processing and Distribution Center has exhibited excellence in effective safety and health program management,” said OSHA Regional Administrator Richard Terrill. “Their outstanding efforts have included significant management commitment and employee involvement.”

Significant indeed. The Boise PDC has an injury and illness rate that is 64 percent lower than the average postal facility and has reduced that rate by more than 60 percent in the last three years.

Boise is the first postal facility to be accepted as a VPP Star site under the new OSHA Corporate VPP, designed to streamline the process for large corporations with stan-

dardized safety and health programs, allowing for multiple facilities to apply for and enter the VPP.

Business Connect takes hold: Wrestling supply company pinned down by Postmaster

The amateur wrestling supplier simply didn’t know all that the Postal Service had to offer. But the business owner had seen the “Angie” TV commercial and was intrigued about Carrier Pickup service.

That preparation helped Carlton make his move through the Business Connect program and a follow-up meeting with the customer and Seattle District Small Business Specialist Rhonda Kelly.

The sale may bring in as much as \$1 million in new revenue.

Keepers by the dozen: Lunar New Year souvenir sheet reissued

One of the Postal Service’s most popular souvenir sheets, Lunar New Year, is available now at the new 39-cent postage price.

The images on the individual stamps are intricate paper-cut designs identifying the Years of the Rat, Ox, Tiger, Hare, Dragon, Snake, Horse, Sheep, Monkey, Rooster, Dog and Boar.

The Lunar New Year is celebrated by people of Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, Tibetan and Mongolian heritage. The Postal Service issued the first of the 12 stamps in its award-winning Lunar New Year series in 1992 in observance of the holiday. Since then, additional stamps were issued until all 12 animals associated with the Chinese lunar calendar were represented.

Also known as the Spring Festival, the traditional Chinese New Year is a time of renewed hope for a prosperous future.

usps.com Week Preparation

This year, *usps.com week* is **March 27–31, 2006**. **Post Offices™ must confirm *usps.com week* events no later than 8 P.M. EST on February 24, 2006**. This means that the location, date, and time must be secured and information available to order invitations for scheduled events around My Desktop Post Office™ (MDTPO). Local people coordinating these events need to work through their respective district advertising coordinators or customer relations coordinators (CRCs) that have Message Maker access.

In an effort to reduce costs and increase production efficiencies, all invitations and “Take Ones” will be produced in one batch regardless of when the event is scheduled. Invitations will be stored until it is time to drop so they arrive in customers’ mailboxes 7 to 10 working days prior to the scheduled event. Once invitations are ordered and printed, no information on the event can be changed. It is critical that people check to ensure the information is correct and changes are not made after the fact.

Production Schedule

Invitations and MDTPO (Winter Campaign) Take Ones orders must be placed between February 20, 2006, at 8:00 A.M. EST and February 24, 2006, at 8 P.M. EST. The orders will be in production status February 28

and March 1, 2006. The first round of shipping from the printer will be during the week of March 6, 2006, so they are delivered between March 9 and March 15, 2006. If you cannot schedule your event during *usps.com week* and plan customer events around MDTPO, you may want to schedule your event in April after you receive the second round of shipping mailed the week of March 27, 2006. Remember, to order the invitations and the MDTPO Take Ones, local personnel must work through their district advertising coordinator or CRC.

usps.com week puts you in a great position to deliver some of our most convenient, easy-to-use solutions to your small business customers just in time for tax day, and for the busy spring shipping season, which includes Mothers’ Day, graduations, and Fathers’ Day. We encourage you to start planning activities now.

Back Pay Claims Processing — Life Insurance Coverage

Effective February 16, 2006, *Employee and Labor Relations Manual* (ELM) 436.43, Life Insurance Coverage, is renumbered to be ELM 436.5, to improve the overall organization of this section. Subsequent sections are renumbered accordingly.

The text of newly numbered 436.5 (formerly 436.43), Life Insurance Coverage, is revised to clarify how employees in nonpay status, separated employees, and new employees hired due to settlement or decision may obtain life insurance coverage or change existing coverage once they are returned to duty in a pay status following reinstatement or accession. These coverage rules are governed by the Federal Employees' Group Life Insurance (FEGLI) Program.

436.5 Life Insurance Coverage

If an individual is restored to duty in a pay status, or hired through a settlement or decision, life insurance coverage is dealt with according to Federal Employees' Group Life Insurance (FEGLI) Program regulations, depending on the circumstances encountered during the back pay period, as follows:

- a. *Employee is on the rolls but in nonpay status.* While the employee is in nonpay status, basic and optional coverage continue without cost for up to 12 months. After 12 months, coverage ceases, subject to a 31-day extension. (This 12-month period in nonpay status may be broken by periods of less than 4 consecutive months in pay status. If the employee returns to pay status for a period of 4 consecutive months or more, a new 12-month period of continued coverage begins.) When the employee returns to duty in a pay status, if coverage has ceased, on the first day of his or her return, basic and optional insurance are restored automatically, according to the last election on file (see 534.1, LWOP). Until coverage ceases, optional insurance may be elected, or increased, if the employee submits SF 2817, *Life Insurance Election (FEGLI)*, within 60 days of experiencing a qualifying life event (e.g., marriage, divorce, death of spouse, birth or adoption of child).
- b. *Employee is separated from the Postal Service for less than 180 days.* On the last day in pay status, basic and optional coverage cease, subject to a 31-day extension (see 535.6, Termination). The employee may also convert FEGLI coverage to an individual policy. When the employee is reinstated, the employee automatically receives the FEGLI coverage according to his or her last election on file. The FEGLI regulations allow changes to this election under any one of the following three circumstances:
 - (1) *FEGLI Open Season.* A new election form may be submitted during a FEGLI Open Season.
 - (2) *Satisfactory medical information.* An employee who waived life insurance before the separation may acquire Basic Life Insurance and Option A — Standard and/or Option B — Additional (up to a total of five multiples) insurance by providing satisfactory medical information to the Office of Federal Employees' Group Life Insurance (OFEGLI) by using SF 2822, *Request for*

Insurance (FEGLI). If the request is approved, the employee is automatically signed up for Basic Life Insurance. He or she is given 31 days to elect Option A and/or Option B by submitting SF 2817. An employee who already has Basic Life Insurance may elect Option A and/or Option B or increase Option B multiples by providing satisfactory medical information through the same procedure. The employee must meet pay and duty status requirements to have the coverage become effective.

- (3) *Qualifying life event.* An employee who has Basic Life Insurance coverage may elect Option B or Option C or increase multiples of Option B or C (up to a total of five multiples) if there is a qualifying life event during the separation or during the 60-day period immediately before the separation. The employee is given 31 days from the date of reinstatement, or 60 days from the date of the event, whichever gives the employee more time, to elect optional insurance by submitting SF 2817. An employee who experiences a qualifying life event after returning to service has 60 days from the qualifying life event to increase FEGLI coverage. The amount of coverage that can be elected can vary depending on the life event and eligible family members. (See the chart under Life Event in FE 76-20, *FEGLI Program Booklet for Postal Service Employees.*)

c. *Employee is separated from the Postal Service for 180 days or more.* On the last day in pay status, basic and optional coverage cease, subject to a 31-day extension (see 535.6, Termination). When the employee is reinstated, any waiver of insurance previously on file is cancelled. Basic Life Insurance becomes effective on the first day the employee returns to duty in a pay status. The employee may file a new waiver of coverage or elect optional insurance within 31 days of returning to duty by submitting SF 2817. If the employee files no election, he or she is given the optional insurance on file immediately before the break in service.

d. *Individual hired as a new employee of the Postal Service.* As a new employee, the individual is eligible for basic and optional insurance according to 531.2, Eligible Employees, subject to 531.3, Exclusions. Basic Life Insurance coverage begins for an eligible employee on the first day of duty in a pay status, and he or she has 31 days to elect optional insurance by submitting SF 2817.

e. *Individual dies during the back pay period.* According to 5 U.S.C. 8706(d), if the insurance of an employee stops because of separation from the service or suspension without pay, and the separation or suspension is thereafter officially found to have been erroneous, the employee is deemed to have been insured during the period of erroneous separation or suspension. Deductions otherwise required by 5 U.S.C. 8707 are not withheld from any back pay awarded for the period of separation or suspension unless death or accidental dismemberment of the employee occurs during such period. Deductions must be made from the back pay awarded in these two situations because an insurance claim is paid.

All systems and services must align with the Postal Service Enterprise Architecture and use standards to leverage the benefits of faster deployment and cheaper development and operation.

PUBLICATION 51 REVISION

Addition of Rates for the Marshall Islands and Micronesia

Effective February 16, 2006, we are revising Publication 51, *International Postal Rates and Fees*, to include an appendix containing the rates for the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the Federated States of Micronesia.

Under agreements negotiated by the United States government with the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the Federated States of Micronesia, effective January 8, 2006, mail destined to these two countries use the international rate schedules. However, because the new rates will be phased in over at least 5 years, the rates do not fit into the current international rate groups. Previously, Publication 51 referred readers to the Individual Country Listings (ICLs) in the *International Mail Manual* (IMM) for rates to the

Marshall Islands and Micronesia, but it will be easier for customers who use Publication 51 to have those rates included directly in the publication.

REMINDER

International Inquiries and Claims

As noted in the article titled "IMM Revision: International Inquiry, Claims, and Postage Refund Processes" in *Postal Bulletin* 22172 (1-19-06, pages 20 and 45–50), effective January 17, 2006, customers should call 800-222-1811 to inquire about the status of registered, recorded delivery, and insured or ordinary parcel post items.

Customers must allow sufficient time for delivery of the mailpiece to the foreign country and must initiate inquiries within the following time limits:

- For articles sent by Global Express Guaranteed® service or Global Express Mail® with Guarantee service,

not earlier than 3 days from the date of mailing but not later than 30 days.

- For articles sent by Global Express Mail service, not earlier than 3 days from the date of mailing but not later than 90 days.
- For registered letter post, recorded delivery, or insured and ordinary parcel post sent by airmail, not earlier than 7 days from the date of mailing but not later than 6 months.
- For registered letter post, recorded delivery, or insured and ordinary parcel post sent by economy

(surface) mail, not earlier than 30 days from the date of mailing but not later than 6 months.

Prior to the new process of making inquiries by telephone, customers were required to go to their local Post Offices™ to complete PS Form 542, *Inquiry About a Registered Article or an Insured Parcel or an Ordinary Article*. PS Form 542 is now obsolete and is no longer part of the inquiry process. However, if a customer presents an already completed PS Form 542, the retail associate must add the customer's telephone number to the form and send the completed form to the following address:

For further information about international inquiries and claims, please review the following "Frequently Asked Questions" and their answers.

1. *The new international inquiry procedures are effective for packages mailed after January 1, 2006, but how do customers file an inquiry on packages mailed before that date?*

Even if a package was mailed before January 1, 2006, customers should call 800-222-1811 to initiate inquiries for mail sent to or from all foreign countries within the time limits listed above.

2. *How will customers be notified of the results of their inquiries?*

The International Inquiry Center will notify customers of the results of the inquiry via telephone or letter.

If an inquiry results in a determination that the item was lost, damaged, or rifled (i.e., if contents were missing), the International Inquiry Center will send the customer PS Form 2855, *Claim for Indemnity — International Registered, Insured, and Express Mail*, with instruction to complete the form and return it, with supporting documentation, to the St. Louis Accounting Service Center (ASC).

If the claim is for a Global Express Mail article, the International Inquiry Center will include in the claim package PS Form 2861, *Express Mail International Service Inquiry*, and, if applicable, PS Form 3533, *Application and Voucher for Refund of Postage, Fees, and Services*.

3. *How does the customer file the claim?*

A customer can file a claim in either of the following situations:

- After making an inquiry for mail sent to or from any foreign country.

- After receiving a damaged article mailed from a foreign country.

If the claim is a result of an inquiry, the customer must file the claim by completing PS Form 2855. The customer must attach evidence of insurance, evidence of value, and any other documentation to support the claim and return the claim form to the following address:

If the customer received a damaged article mailed from a foreign country, the customer may file a claim at a local Post Office by requesting PS Form 2855. The customer must present the article and mailing container, including the wrapper, packaging, and any other contents that were received. To support the claim, the customer must also present evidence of insurance or ordinary indemnity coverage, and evidence of value.

4. *What is the new ordinary parcel indemnity coverage?*

Indemnity for ordinary (i.e., uninsured) parcels became part of the air and economy parcel post service effective January 1, 2006. The ordinary indemnity is based on the weight of the package (not the value of the contents). In POS ONE and IRT offices, this calculation is done automatically. In manual offices, personnel perform the calculation based on the table in *International Mail Manual* (IMM) Exhibit 281.4. This table was also published in the article titled "IMM Revision: Changes in International Mail" in *Postal Bulletin* 22169 (12-8-05, pages 18–25 — the table appears on pages 19 and 20).

5. *What is the difference between ordinary indemnity and insured service?*

The difference between the new ordinary indemnity and insured service is that ordinary indemnity is provided at no additional charge and is based on the weight of the package, which may or may not reflect the value of the contents of the package. A customer may still purchase insurance to many destinations — check the individual country listing in the IMM for service availability. If the customer purchases insurance, the ordinary indemnity does not apply.

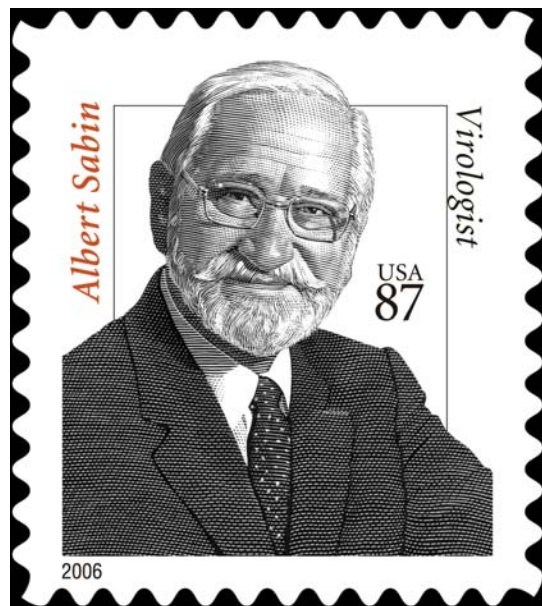

Note: Mail order catalogs are prohibited as SAM or PAL mail.

A. Securities, currency, or precious metals in their raw, unmanufactured state are prohibited. Official shipments are exempt from this restriction.

A1. Mail addressed to "Any Servicemember," or similar wording such as "Any Soldier," "Sailor," "Airman," or "Marine"; "Military Mail"; etc., is prohibited. Mail must be addressed to an individual or job title such as "Commander," "Commanding Officer," etc.

B. PS Form 2976-A is required for all mail weighing 16 ounces or more, with exceptions noted below. In addition, mailers must properly complete required customs documentation when mailing any potentially dutiable mail addressed to an APO or FPO regardless of weight. The following are exceptions to the requirement for customs documentation on nondutiable mail that weighs 16 ounces or more:

- Known mailers are exempt from providing customs documentation on non-dutiable letters, and printed matter weighing 16 ounces or more. (A known mailer is anyone who legally applies a permit imprint to a mailpiece. Mail with meter postage is not considered to be from a known mailer.)
- All federal, state, and local government agencies are exempt from providing customs documentation on mail addressed to an APO or FPO, except for those APOs/FPOs to which restriction B2 applies.
- Prepaid mail from military contractors is exempt, providing the mailpiece is endorsed "Contents for Official Use — Exempt from Customs Requirements."

B1. PS Form 2976 or 2976-A is required. Articles are liable for customs duty and/or purchase tax unless they are bona fide gifts intended for use by military personnel or their dependents. When the contents of a parcel meet these requirements, the mailer must endorse the customs form, "Certified to be a bona fide gift, personal effects, or items for personal use of military personnel and dependents," under the heading, Description of Contents. **Exceptions:** All other exceptions listed in restriction B above are applicable to this restriction.

B2. All federal, state, and local government agencies must complete customs documentation when sending mail addressed to or from this APO or FPO weighing 16 ounces or more.

C. Cigarettes and other tobacco products are prohibited.

C1. Obscene articles, prints, paintings, cards, films, videotapes, etc., and horror comics and matrices are prohibited.

D. Coffee is prohibited.

E1. Medicines or vaccines not conforming to French laws are prohibited.

E2. Any matter depicting nude or seminude persons, pornographic or sexual items, or nonauthorized political materials is prohibited. Although religious materials contrary to the Islamic faith are prohibited in bulk quantities, items for the personal use of the addressee are permissible.

E3. Radio transceivers, cordless telephones, global positioning systems, scanners, base stations, and handheld transmitters are prohibited.

F. Firearms of any type are prohibited in all classes of mail. See definitions of firearms in DMM 601.11.1.2c. This restriction does not apply to firearms mailed to or by official U.S. government agencies. The restriction for mail to this APO/FPO ZIP Code does not apply to firearms mailed from this APO/FPO ZIP Code, provided ATF and USPS regulations are met. Antique firearms are a separate category defined in DMM 601.11.2 and ATF regulations; they do not require an ATF form.

F1. Privately owned weapons addressed to an individual are prohibited in any class of mail.

F2. Importation of firearms is restricted to one shotgun and one single shot .22 caliber rifle per individual.

G. Only First-Class Mail letters, Periodicals, and Standard Mail items are authorized.

H. Meats, including preserved meats, whether hermetically sealed or not, are prohibited.

H1. Pork or pork by-products are prohibited.

I. Mail of all classes must fit in a mail sack. Mail may not exceed the following dimensions:

over 42" to 44"	24" girth
over 44" to 46"	20" girth
over 46" to 48"	16" girth
Maximum length	48"

This restriction does not apply to registered mail and official government mail marked MOM.

I1. This restriction does not apply to registered mail.

I2. This restriction does not apply to official government mail marked MOM.

J. Parcels may not exceed 108 inches in length and girth combined.

K. Mail that includes in the address the words, "Dependent Mail Section," may consist only of letter mail, newspapers, magazines, and books. No parcel of any class containing any other matter may be mailed to the Dependent Mail section. This restriction does not apply if the address does not include the words "Dependent Mail Section."

L. All official mail is prohibited.

M. Fruits, animals, and living plants are prohibited.

N. Registered mail is prohibited.

O. Personal mail addressed to vessels using this number is limited to unregistered First-Class Mail items and certified mail. Other classes of mail are prohibited.

P. APO is used for the receipt and dispatch of official mail only.

Q. Mail may not exceed 66 pounds, and size is limited to 42 inches maximum length and 72 inches maximum length and girth combined.

R. All alcoholic beverages, including those mailable under DMM 601.8.0, are prohibited.

R1. Materials used in the production of alcoholic beverages (i.e., distilling material, hops, malts, yeast, etc.) are prohibited.

T. Mailings of case lots of food and supplemental household shipments must be approved by the sender's parent agency prior to mailing.

U. Parcels must weigh less than 16 ounces when addressed to Box R. This restriction does not apply to mail endorsed "Free Matter for the Blind or Handicapped."

U1. Mail is limited to First-Class Mail weighing 13 ounces or less when addressed to Box R. This restriction does not apply to mail endorsed "Free Matter for the Blind or Handicapped." Videotapes are prohibited when addressed to Box R, regardless of weight.

U2. Mail is limited to First-Class Mail letters only when addressed to Box R.

U3. Mail is limited to First-Class Mail correspondence (including voice and video cassettes), newspapers, magazines, photographs, not exceeding 16 ounces, when addressed to Box R.

V. Express Mail Military Service (EMMS) not available from any origin.

W. Meat products, such as dried beef, salami, and sausage, may be mailed, provided they remain in their original, hermetically sealed packages and bear USDA certification. Other meats, bones, skin, hair, feathers, horns or hoofs of hoofed animals, wool samples, tobacco leaves, including chewing and pipe tobacco, snuff, cigars, and cigarettes, or obscene material, including obscene drawings, photographs, films, and carvings, are prohibited. Exception: 200 grams of tobacco per parcel are permitted duty free.

X. Personal mail is limited to First-Class Mail items (to include audio cassettes and voice tapes) weighing 13 ounces or less. This limitation does not apply to official mail.

Y. Mail is limited to First-Class and Priority Mail items only. All Periodicals, Standard Mail items, and Package Services items (including SAM and PAL) are not authorized. This restriction also applies to official mail.

Z. No outside pieces (OSPs).

Z1. The following restriction is applicable only to International Service Centers (ISC)/Exchange Offices. An Anti-Pilferage Seal (Item No O817E or O818A) is required on all pouches and sacks.

Missing Children Poster Display Instructions

Please display this poster prominently on bulletin boards in retail lobbies of main Post Offices™, classified stations, and branches. Operators of contract postal units may display this poster at their option.

Companion posters, authorized for display on bulletin boards maintained by employee organizations, appear periodically in *The Postal Record*, a publication for members of the National Association of Letter Carriers.

This poster is published in cooperation with the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children, the United States Department of Justice, and the National Association of Letter Carriers. Information appearing on this poster is selected solely by the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC).

In addition to *Postal Bulletin* updates, NCMEC distributes information via broadcast fax. Notification of newly reported missing children is sent to designated district "Missing Children" coordinators at fax numbers provided by district managers. Within 24 hours of receipt of a facsimile Missing Children poster, district coordinators should distribute copies to all Postal Service™ facilities in their districts. Missing Children posters are to be displayed for 30 days in Post Office lobbies, workroom floor areas, and other Postal Service facilities, unless notification is received (from NCMEC) to remove a particular poster sooner. The broadcast fax network is used to distribute posters and information in only the most urgent cases of missing and exploited children. This system supplements, but does not replace, the missing children information in this *Postal Bulletin*.

Missing Children posters are available to the U.S. Postal Service® only as described above. If Postal Service employees are contacted by individuals or local agencies about displaying a sign or poster of a missing child in local Post Offices, the individual or agency should be politely informed that the U.S. Postal Service displays only those posters provided by NCMEC, because it has been designated by the U.S. Department of Justice to be the national clearinghouse and resource center for missing and exploited children. The individual or agency should then be referred to NCMEC at 800-843-5678.

Crops of the Americas Stamps

The Postal Service™ will issue *Crops of the Americas* definitive stamps in five designs, on March 16, 2006, in New York, New York. The stamps, designed by Phil Jordan, Falls Church, Virginia, go on sale nationwide March 17, 2006.

These stamps will be available in three formats:

- PSA vending booklet of 20 (Item 675700).
- Pressure-sensitive (PSA) double-sided booklet of 20 (Item 675800).
- PSA coil of 100 (Item 784100).

Artist Steve Buchanan, Winsted, Connecticut, created each of the five stamp designs. As reference, he used slide photographs made by his wife Rita Buchanan's research in the late 1970s on indigenous agricultural methods in the southwestern United States.

The crops depicted in the stamps — corn, chili peppers, beans, squashes, and sunflowers — had been cultivated in the Americas for centuries when Europeans first arrived in the New World.

Pictorial Postmarks Announcement

As a community service, the Postal Service™ offers pictorial postmarks to commemorate local events celebrated in communities throughout the nation. A list of events for which pictorial postmarks are authorized appears below. If available, the sponsor of the pictorial postmark appears in italics under the date. Also provided, as space permits, are illustrations of those postmarks that were reproducible and available at press time.

People attending these local events may obtain the postmark in person at the temporary Post Office™ station established there. Those who cannot attend the event, but who wish to obtain the postmark, may submit a mail order request. Pictorial postmarks are available only for the dates indicated, and *requests must be postmarked no later than 30 days following the requested pictorial postmark date.*

All requests must include a stamped envelope or postcard bearing at least the minimum First-Class Mail® postage. Items submitted for postmark may not include

postage issued after the date of the requested postmark. Such items will be returned unserved.

Customers wishing to obtain a postmark should affix stamps to any envelope or postcard of their choice, address the envelope or postcard to themselves or others, insert a card of postcard thickness in envelopes for sturdiness, and tuck in the flap. Place the envelope or postcard in a larger envelope and address it to: PICTORIAL POSTMARKS, followed by the NAME OF THE STATION, ADDRESS, CITY, STATE, ZIP+4® CODE, exactly as listed below (using all capitals and no punctuation, except the hyphen in the ZIP+4 code).

Customers can also send stamped envelopes and postcards without addresses for postmark, as long as they supply a larger envelope with adequate postage and their return address. After applying the pictorial postmark, the Postal Service returns the items (with or without addresses) under addressed protective cover.

Equally important is controlling the cost of using the tool.

Using eBuy to Order Expedited Package Supplies

Post Offices can order expedited package supplies by telephone, fax, or mail through the Express and Priority Mail Supply Center (E&PMSC) in Indianapolis, Indiana.

In addition, Post Offices can order expedited package supplies through an eBuy catalog. By using eBuy, we are able to better control supplies and reduce fulfillment center costs.

Benefits of Using eBuy

Some benefits of using eBuy for ordering expedited package supplies include the following:

- Maintaining lower operating and administrative costs through automation of the ordering process.
- Reducing the cost for services through the fulfillment center.
- Improving control over contract spending.
- Providing shorter approval and fulfillment cycles.
- Improving purchase control.

An electronic data interchange process, eBuy should be your first choice of ordering expedited package supplies. The operational benefits and financial gains are substantial, and they support the strategies of the Postal Service Transformation Plan.

Use Current eBay Instructions to Order Expedited Package Supplies

Use the following steps when placing orders for expedited package supplies:

1. Before placing an order, you must have a valid Federal Standard Requisitioning and Issue Procedures

Number (FEDSTRIP #) and ensure that locally established ordering procedures have been followed. Your finance number will not be charged.

2. The cost of these supplies is a Headquarters expense. When orders are through eBay, management approvals are automated. When you submit your requirement(s), eBay automatically generates an approval request to the first approver in your approval chain. If additional approval is necessary, eBay will generate approval requests to each subsequent approver in your approval chain. eBay provides the requester with status updates. Requesters should review the updates to ensure that requests have been approved, forwarded to the supplier for fulfillment, acknowledged by the supplier, and shipped by the supplier.
3. Postal Service facilities may order only the products available in the catalog. If a Postal Service facility attempts to order expedited package supplies that are neither in the available quantity nor in available style, the order will automatically cancel. Postal Service facilities will not be notified of the cancellation.
4. To obtain or make a change (such as address) to a FEDSTRIP, contact your material management specialist who will submit a request to the Material Distribution Center (MDC) Customer Service. Making the change can take up to 5 days. Ensure that your FEDSTRIP information is correct.
5. Once the approval process is completed, the delivery of the supplies should be within 5 to 10 business days via Parcel Post® service (except Saturday, Sunday, and holidays). Orders will be delivered to the address associated with the requiring office's assigned FEDSTRIP number.

Direct all questions about the eBay system to the eBay Help Desk at 800-USPS-HELP (press option 1, option 2, and option 8). Offices without Internet access can order expedited package supplies through the MDC. Orders may be submitted by touch tone order entry. To order, call 800-332-0317, option 1 and then option 2.

Note: You must register to use TTOE. To register, call 800-332-0317, option 1, extension 2925, and follow the prompts to leave a message. Wait 48 hours after registering to place your first order.

Air Transportation Surcharge for Live Animals

Effective immediately, there will be a surcharge for live animals accepted in Omaha, Nebraska, and there will not be a \$0.99 surcharge in Las Vegas, Nevada, as described below.

The surcharge for live animals (including day-old poultry) transported by air from an airport listed below to a destination city in Zones 4–8 is \$0.99 per pound (or fraction thereof). This surcharge is in addition to the normal postage that retail associates collect.

If your processing facility uses an airport listed below for air transportation of live animals (including day-old poultry), the 'L' alpha code mail class designator must be assigned on the distribution and routing tag.

Follow this procedure for all mail classes transported from the following airports.

NOTICE

Conduct on Postal Service Property — Update on Prohibitions on Signature Solicitation

In the article “Conduct on Postal Service Property — Prohibitions on Signature Solicitation” in *Postal Bulletin* 22119 (1-8-04, page 19), we informed Postal Service™ managers of the favorable decision in *Initiative and Referendum Institute v. United States Postal Service*, in which the District Court for the District of Columbia upheld the Conduct on Postal Property (COPP) regulations ban against soliciting signatures on Postal Service property. The plaintiffs filed an appeal in the Court of Appeals for the DC Circuit and an opinion was issued on August 9, 2005. The Court of Appeals vacated the earlier decision and remanded the case back to the District Court. The case is now being relitigated in the District Court. In its opinion, the appellate court strongly suggested that the Postal Service amend its regulations to clarify certain points. The court did not issue an injunction against the Postal Service or otherwise mandate suspension of the prohibition. As such, **the prohibition against soliciting signatures on Postal Service property is still valid and must be enforced.** Based on the appellate opinion, on December 1, 2005, the Postal Service published amendments to the regulations in the

Federal Register, 70 FR 72078. These amendments are explained in detail below.

The earlier *Postal Bulletin* article clarified two matters. First, it pointed out that the prohibition against soliciting signatures extends only to efforts to have members of the public provide signatures on Postal Service premises, and not to communications that promote the signing of petitions, polls, and surveys somewhere other than on Postal Service premises. In the recent amendments, the Postal Service further clarified this by changing the phrase “soliciting signatures” to “collecting signatures.”

In the earlier article, the Law Department also advised Postal Service managers that the regulations did not apply to municipal or other perimeter sidewalks, even if the Postal Service’s property line extends onto such a sidewalk, or even if there is some obligation on the part of the Postal Service to maintain the city sidewalk, such as by removing snow. This advice was based on a Supreme Court decision, *United States v. Grace*. In that case the Court determined that the federal regulations at issue, similar to the

Postal Service’s Conduct on Postal Property (COPP) regulations, could not be enforced, even though the sidewalks surrounding the Supreme Court Building, hereinafter known as “Grace sidewalks,” were owned by the federal government. This was because members of the public could not distinguish them from other municipal or public sidewalks in Washington, DC. As such, members of the public would not be able to tell that they had entered a “federal enclave” where special rules applied, potentially chilling free speech activities.

The appellate court in the Initiative and Referendum Institute (IRI) case had similar concerns about the Postal Service’s COPP regulations, suggesting that even though the Postal Service had made it clear to postal managers that the rules did not apply to Grace sidewalks, members of the public, just as in the Grace case, had not been notified and would not be able to tell where the COPP regulations applied and where they did not. Therefore, the regulations have been amended to reflect the Postal Service’s established non-enforcement policy.

Note that in the earlier *Postal Bulletin* article, the Law Department advised that none of the COPP regulations applied to Grace sidewalks that are indistinguishable from adjacent municipal or other public sidewalks. The recent amendments clarify that this enforcement exception for Grace sidewalks applies only to sections 39 *Code of Federal Regulations* (CFR) 232.1(h); *Postal Operations Manual* (POM) 124.54 and 39 CFR 232.1(o); POM 124.55. These are the provisions involving expressive, or free speech, activities. This includes newspaper vending machines, which may be placed on Grace sidewalks, provided they do not violate other provisions of the regulations, such as impeding ingress and egress from Post Office™ facilities. The rest of the conduct regulations may be enforced on Grace sidewalks, such as the prohibitions against causing disturbances (39 CFR 232.1(e); POM 124.51); blocking entrances, driveways, loading platforms, or fire hydrants (39 CFR 232.1(k)(4); POM 124.42.d); or gambling (39 CFR 232.1(f); POM 124.52.)

The amended regulations are now in full force and effect and the amended language is found below.

* * * * *

Section 232.1(a) was amended as follows:

- (a) *Applicability.* This section applies to all real property under the charge and control of the Postal Service, to all tenant agencies, and to all persons entering in or on such property. This section shall be posted and kept posted at a conspicuous place on all such property. This section shall not apply to—
 - (i) Any portions of real property, owned or leased by the Postal Service, that are leased or subleased by the Postal Service to private tenants for their exclusive use;
 - (ii) With respect to sections 232.1(h)(1) and 232.1(o), sidewalks along the street frontage of postal property falling within the property lines of the Postal Service that are not physically distinguishable from adjacent municipal or other public sidewalks, and any paved areas adjacent to such sidewalks that are not physically distinguishable from such sidewalks.

* * * * *

Sec. 232.1(e), added the phrase “impedes ingress to or egress from post offices, or otherwise” before the term “obstructs.”

Section 232.1(h)(1), the words “soliciting signatures” were removed and the words “collecting signatures” were added in their place. The phrase “and impeding ingress to or egress from post offices” was deleted from this section and placed in section 232.1(e), as indicated above.

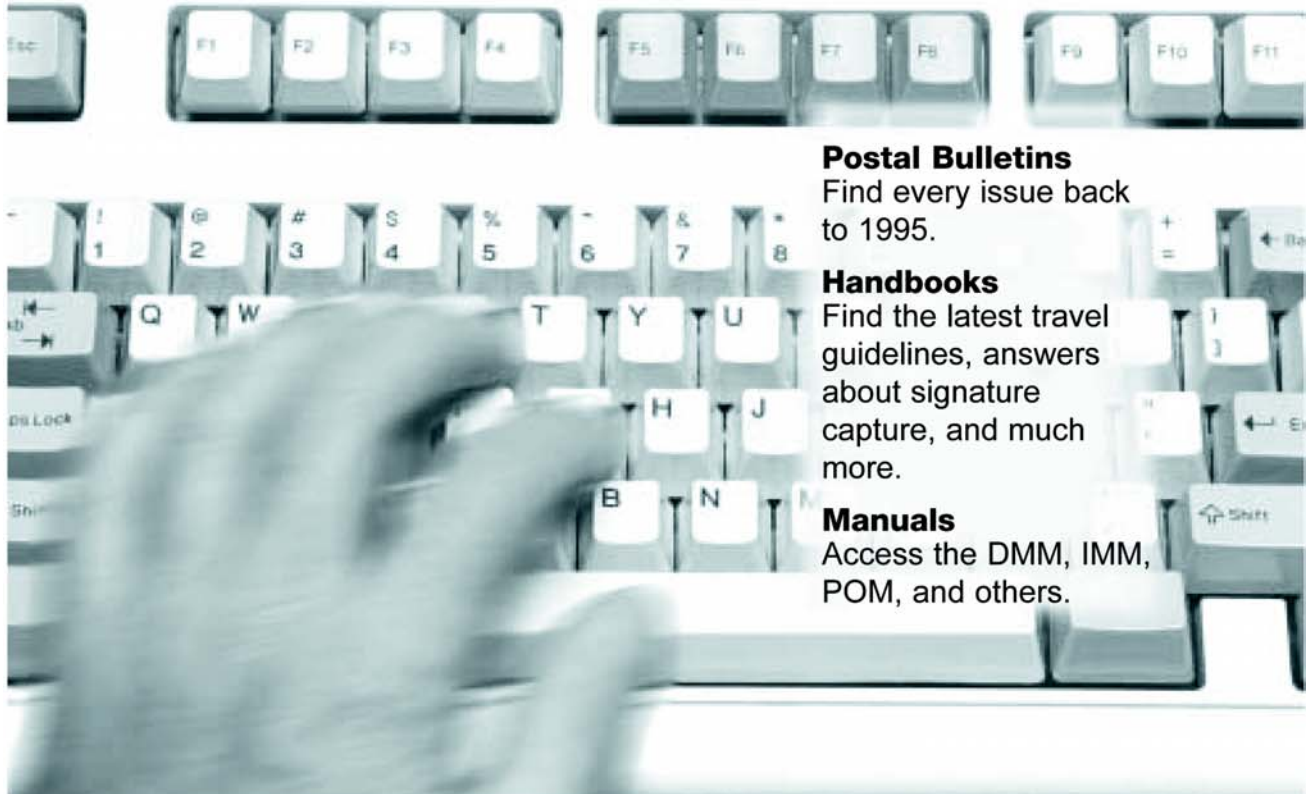
