Beat the Heat, Stay Cool

In May, the Postal Service™ deployed a *Safety Depends on Me* campaign titled “Beat the Heat, Stay Cool” to provide information to carriers delivering mail in hot weather.

As temperatures begin to rise, the potential for heat-related illnesses increase. Therefore, it’s important to remember the keys to staying cool and safe this summer season.

Here are some quick tips for battling the heat:

1. Hydrate before, during, and after work. Prevention is important, so make sure to drink at least eight 8-ounce glasses of water per day.
2. Dress appropriately for the weather. On warm days, make sure to wear light colored, loose-fitting, breathable clothing to keep body temperatures down.
3. Use shade to stay cool. When possible, use shaded areas to stay out of direct sunlight.
4. Know the signs of heat stress. You should understand what heat stress is, and how it can affect your health and safety. Here are some things to look out for:
 - Hot, dry skin or profuse sweating.
 - Headache.
 - Confusion or dizziness.
 - Nausea.
 - Muscle cramps.
 - Weakness or fatigue.
 - Rash.

Finally, it’s important to notify your supervisor or call 911 if you’re experiencing signs of heat-related illnesses. This will not only ensure your safety, but can also save your life.

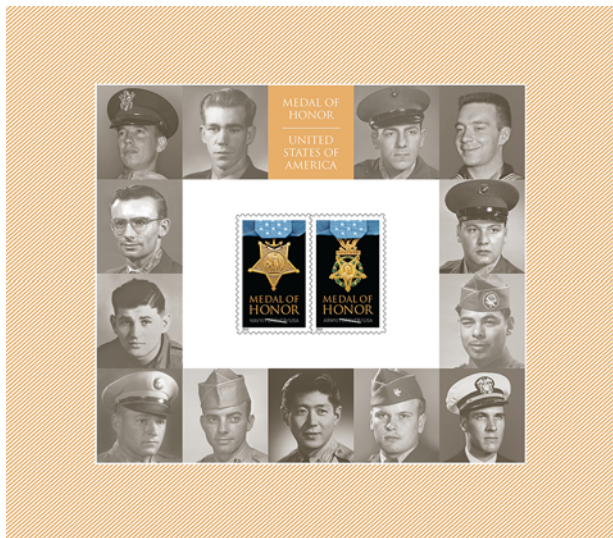

Publicity Kit: Medal of Honor: Korean War Forever Stamps



On Saturday, July 26, 2014, at 11 a.m. ET, the Postal Service™ will conduct the first-day-of-issue ceremony for the *Medal of Honor: Korean War Forever*® stamps. The ceremony will take place in Arlington, VA, at the Arlington National Cemetery Memorial Amphitheater. Many veterans and Medal of Honor recipients are expected to attend.

Only 145 of the 6.8 million members who served in the U.S. Armed Forces during the Korean War were deemed to have met the standard necessary to warrant the Medal of Honor. Two-thirds of the 145 recipients were killed in action while performing the valorous actions that resulted in an award of the Medal of Honor.

Sadly, William R. Charette, James L. Stone, Rodolfo P. Hernandez, and Ola L. Mize died before the stamps could be issued. Their photographs are still included as they were alive at the time of the stamp proposal.

THE MEDAL OF HONOR, the nation's highest award for valor in combat, dates to 1861, when Abraham Lincoln signed the first bill authorizing the award into law. Today, the medal is presented "for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life, above and beyond the call of duty."

The President presents the medal on behalf of Congress, which is why the award is sometimes called the Congressional Medal of Honor. Of the 6.8 million Americans who served in the armed forces during the Korean War, only 145 received the Medal of Honor. More than two-thirds of the recipients were killed in action.

On March 28, 2014, President Barack Obama presented the Medal of Honor to 24 Army veterans whose bravery had been previously recognized by the Distinguished Service Cross, the nation's second highest military decoration. The long-overdue upgrade to the Medal of Honor followed a congressionally mandated review of records from World War II and the Korean and Vietnam Wars to ensure that the heroism of our veterans had not been overlooked because of prejudice or discrimination. At the White House ceremony, nine Medals of Honor were awarded posthumously to Korean War veterans.

In January 2014, the U.S. Postal Service® invited the last living recipients of the award from the Korean War to join in honoring the extraordinary courage of every individual who received the Medal of Honor for his service during the war. All the men pictured here agreed to participate in this momentous event. Sadly, William B. Chase, Rodolfo P. Hernandez, James L. Stone, and Ola L. Mize died before the stamps could be issued. Their photographs are still included, as they remain among the last representatives of a remarkable group whose courage and devotion we honor with this issuance.

Medal of Honor Etiquette

When referring to individuals awarded the Medal of Honor, always refer to them as "recipients" who have earned the award or "awardees." Never use the term "won" or "winner" as it implies a competition. The Medal is not named the Congressional Medal of Honor. The true name of the medal is Medal of Honor. Visit the Congressional

Medal of Honor Society website at <http://www.cmohs.org> for information on all Medal of Honor recipients.

When referring to these Medal of Honor recipients who served in the Army, refer to them as soldiers. Marines who are no longer serving in the Corps are referred to as Marines, former Marines, or retired Marines — but never as ex-Marines.

Korean War: Medal of Honor Stamp Sheet

The *Medal of Honor: Korean War* stamp sheet consists of a large sheet folded in half to form four separate pages. When folded, the two-pane design is 8 ½ inches wide by 7 ½ inches tall.

The first page of this issuance highlights historic photographs of the last 13 living recipients of the Medal of Honor from the Korean War. The photographs surround two Forever stamps; one features a photograph of the Navy version of the Medal of Honor, and the other features a photograph of the Army version of the award. The Air Force version of the medal is not shown because it was not created until 1965.

In January 2012, the U.S. Postal Service invited the last living Korean War Medal of Honor recipients to join in honoring the extraordinary courage of every member awarded the medal for their valorous actions during the war. All the men pictured here agreed to participate in this momentous event.

The two center pages list the names of all 145 recipients of the Medal of Honor from the Korean War. A short piece of text and a key to the names of the recipients pictured in the cover photos are also included on page two. The remaining 18 stamps are found on the back page, along with a quote describing why the Medal of Honor is awarded, "For conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life, above and beyond the call of duty." Art director Antonio Alcalá of Alexandria, VA, designed the stamps and the new format, while working with photographs of the medals by Richard Frasier of Vienna, VA.

Medal of Honor Background

The Medal of Honor, our nation's most prestigious military decoration, is awarded by the president of the United States to members of the armed forces who distinguished themselves "conspicuously by gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty" while engaged in action against an enemy of the United States.

The idea for the Medal of Honor was conceived during the first year of the Civil War. Men were fighting for their country, yet the nation had no formal system for recognizing or rewarding acts of heroism. Then a senator from Iowa, James W. Grimes, introduced a bill to "promote the efficiency of the Navy" by distributing "medals of honor." President Abraham Lincoln signed the bill into law on December 21, 1861. Lincoln signed a similar measure on behalf of the U.S. Army on July 12, 1862, and the country had two Medals of Honor: one for sailors and one for soldiers. By the time the Civil War ended, 1,525 medals had been awarded, including one to Army surgeon Mary Walker, the only woman ever to receive the Medal of Honor.

Because it was the country's only military medal, the Medal of Honor was awarded more freely at first. But after World War I broke out, the Army and Navy created a series of new decorations to recognize different degrees of accomplishment, including the Distinguished Service

Cross, the Navy Cross, and the Citation Star, later replaced by the Silver Star. As a result, only 124 Medals of Honor were awarded for service in World War I and 464 for World War II.

There are three similar, yet distinct, versions of the Medal of Honor, one for each military department (Army, Navy, and Air Force). The medals are similar in that each consists of a variation of a five-pointed star worn around the neck on a light blue ribbon. The Navy version is awarded to those serving in the Navy and Marine Corps, and during times of war, to members of the Coast Guard. Although not required by any military regulation, according to tradition and the nature of the award, even a four-star general will salute a private who wears the Medal of Honor.

Medal of Honor Myths and Facts

MYTH: *Those who have received the Medal of Honor are "winners" of the highest order.*

FACT: You do not "win" the Medal of Honor, you earn it, and those who have received the Medal are referred to as "recipients."

MYTH: *The Medal of Honor is properly called the Congressional Medal of Honor.*

FACT: The proper terminology is Medal of Honor. The misunderstanding may stem from the fact the Medal is awarded "in the name of the Congress." The fact that the Congress chartered the Society of living Medal of Honor recipients as the "Congressional Medal of Honor Society" in 1958 also confuses the issue.

MYTH: *Medals of Honor have always been awarded only to members of the military while in combat.*

FACT: There was a time when the Medal of Honor was awarded to some individuals for their actions in peacetime. Among them were Admiral Richard Byrd and Floyd Bennett, who were awarded the Medal of Honor for their flight over the North Pole. Charles Lindbergh also received the Medal of Honor for his non-stop flight from New York City to Paris. Since 1940, all Medals of Honor have been awarded for heroism in combat.

MYTH: *No women have ever received the Medal of Honor.*

FACT: One woman, Dr. Mary Walker, received the Medal of Honor for her actions during the Civil War caring for wounded Union soldiers on the battlefield, and then caring for the sick and wounded as a prisoner of war. Her Medal was rescinded by a board of review in 1916 because she was a contract surgeon and not a member of the military. Her Medal was reinstated during the administration of President Carter.

MYTH: *The reason so few Medals of Honor have been awarded in recent years is because the criteria has been tightened.*

FACT: The criterion for awarding the Medal of Honor has not changed in recent years, but the nature of warfare has changed dramatically. Today, our military uses technology (e.g., night vision goggles, stand-off weapons, improved tactics, etc.) to its advantage to minimize threats to the troops. That said, there are still situations where troops are in close contact with the enemy and have demonstrated extraordinary courage warranting award of the Medal of Honor.

MYTH: *No Medals of Honor have been awarded to a member of a foreign military.*

FACT: The Medal of Honor has been awarded to the unknown soldiers of the United Kingdom, France, Italy, Belgium, and Romania from World War I.

Little Known Facts

- More than 60 percent of the Medals of Honor awarded since the beginning of World War II have been awarded posthumously. For the Korean War, more than seven out of ten recipients died to receive this honor.
- No Asian Americans or African Americans were awarded the Medal of Honor in World War II. This was redressed in the early 1990s when, upon review, seven Medals of Honor were awarded to African Americans from World War II and, in 2000, 22 Medals to Asian Americans from World War II.
- There have been two father/son awards of the Medal of Honor. One was President Theodore Roosevelt for leading the charge on San Juan Hill, and his son, Brigadier General Theodore Roosevelt, Jr., for actions on D-Day in World War II. The second was Douglas MacArthur for his heroic action during the Civil War, and his son, Douglas MacArthur, Jr., for action during World War II.
- There have been 19 double recipients of the Medal of Honor. Five of those double awards were for the same action.
- The remains of the unknowns interred in the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington Cemetery from World War I, World War II, and Korea have been awarded the Medal of Honor by the president of the United States following those conflicts. Originally, the remains of the unknown from the Vietnam War were also entombed in the Tomb of the Unknowns and awarded the Medal of Honor. However, because of advances in science, those remains were identified through DNA and returned to the family.

A short piece of text and a key to the names of the recipients pictured in the cover photos are included on the second page. The remaining 18 stamps are found on the back page. Art director Antonio Alcalá of Alexandria, VA, designed the stamps and the new format, while working with photographs of the medals by Richard Frasier of Vienna, VA.

More than 6.8 million Americans served in the armed forces during the Korean War; 145 were singled out to receive the Medal of Honor. Of that number, more than two-thirds died as a result of their heroic actions and received the honor posthumously. The Postal Service is issuing the stamps depicting the Medals of Honor with photographs of the living recipients on the stamp sheet as an appropriate way to recognize the living, while still paying respect to all 145 recipients whose names are included in the *Medal of Honor: Korean War* Forever stamp prestige folio. Thirteen recipients were alive when approached by the Postal Service to include their photographs.

Pictured clockwise from top right center are the surviving Korean War Medal of Honor recipients: Hector A. Cafferata, Jr. of Venice, FL; William R. Charette of Lake Wales, FL (d. 3/18/12); Duane E. Dewey of Irons, MI; Rodolfo P. Hernandez of Fayetteville, NC (d. 12/21/13); Thomas Jerome Hudner, Jr. of Concord, MA; Einar H. Ingman, Jr. of Irma, WI; Hiroshi H. Miyamura of Gallup, NM; Ola L. Mize of Gadsden, AL (d. 3/12/14); Ronald E. Rosser of Roseville, OH; Tibor Rubin of Garden Grove, CA; Robert E. Simanek of Farmington Hills, MI; James L. Stone of Arlington, TX (d. 11/9/12); and, Ernest E. West of Wurtland, KY.

Sadly, William R. Charette, James L. Stone, Rodolfo P. Hernandez, and Ola L. Mize died before the stamps could be issued. Their photographs are still included, as they were alive at the time of the stamp proposal.

The Nation's Highest Award for Valor in Combat

The Medal of Honor, the nation's highest award for valor in combat, is presented "for conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity at the risk of life, above and beyond the call of duty."

The idea for the Medal of Honor was conceived during the first year of the Civil War. Men were fighting for their

country, yet the nation had no formal system for recognizing or rewarding acts of heroism. Then a senator from Iowa, James W. Grimes, introduced a bill to "promote the efficiency of the Navy" by distributing "medals of honor." President Abraham Lincoln signed the bill into law on December 21, 1861. Lincoln signed a similar measure on behalf of the U.S. Army on July 12, 1862, and the country had two Medals of Honor: one for sailors and one for soldiers. By the time the Civil War ended, 1,525 medals had been awarded, including one to Army surgeon Mary Walker, the only woman ever to receive the Medal of Honor.

Because it was the country's only military medal, the Medal of Honor was awarded more freely at first. But after World War I broke out, the Army and Navy created a series of new decorations to recognize different degrees of accomplishment, including the Distinguished Service Cross, the Navy Cross, and the Citation Star, later replaced by the Silver Star. As a result, only 124 Medals of Honor were awarded for service in World War I.

There are three similar, yet distinct, versions of the Medal of Honor, one for each military department (Army, Navy, and Air Force). The medals are similar in that each consists of a variation of a five-pointed star worn around the neck on a light blue ribbon. The Navy version is awarded to those serving in the Navy and Marine Corps, and during times of war, to members of the Coast Guard. Although not required by any military regulation, according to tradition and the nature of the award, even a four-star general will salute a private who wears the Medal of Honor. Ordering First-Day-of-Issue Postmarks

Customers have 60 days to obtain the first-day-of-issue postmark by mail. They may purchase new stamps at local Post Offices, at usps.com/stamps, or by calling 800-STAMP-24. They should affix the stamps to envelopes of their choice, address the envelopes to themselves or others, and place them in larger envelopes addressed to:

After applying the first-day-of-issue postmark, the Postal Service will return the envelopes through the mail. There is no charge for the postmark up to a quantity of 50. For more than 50, there is a 5-cent charge per postmark. All orders must be postmarked by September 24, 2014.

The Medal of Honor is our nation's most prestigious military decoration. It's awarded by the president to members who distinguished themselves "conspicuously by gallantry and intrepidity, at the risk of life above and beyond the call of duty" while engaged in action against an enemy of the United States.

Of the 6.8 million who served America in the Korean War, only 145 received the Medal of Honor. Two-thirds of them died as a result of their heroic actions and received the honor posthumously.

The stamps depicting the Medals of Honor include photographs of the last 13 living recipients at the time the prestige folio stamps were designed. Only nine are alive today. It's an appropriate way to recognize the living, while still paying respect to all recipients whose names are included in the *Medal of Honor: Korean War* stamp set.

Now, on behalf of the United States Postal Service, I want to invite [Insert Names Here] to join me in unveiling the *Medal of Honor: Korean War* Forever stamps.

I would like to take just a few moments to briefly review the heroic achievements of the men who appear on the display behind me. They are pictured from the top right center in clockwise order.

On Nov. 24, 1950, Private Hector Cafferata waged a lone battle with his rifle and grenades to protect his fellow Marines. Making a target of himself, he killed 15, wounded more, and forced the enemy to withdraw. Later that morning an enemy grenade landed in a shallow entrenchment of wounded Marines. Under heavy fire, Cafferata rushed into the gully and hurled it free of his comrades before it exploded, severing part of a finger and seriously wounding him. He continued to fight until hit by a sniper's bullet. President Truman awarded him the Medal of Honor on November 24, 1952.

On March 27, 1953, William Charette covered a wounded Marine from a grenade explosion near Panmunjom, Korea, saving the man's life. On January 12, 1954, Charette became the only living Navy corpsman to receive the Medal during the Korean War.

On April 16, 1952, while being treated by a Navy corpsman near Panmunjom, Korea, Corporal Duane Dewey covered a grenade that fell on the ground beside them, saving the medic's life. On March 12, 1953, President Eisenhower presented Dewey with the Medal of Honor.

On May 31, 1951, Corporal Rodolfo "Rudy" Hernandez held his position against an overwhelming enemy attack, stopping the advance at Wontong-ni, South Korea; he would struggle through years of rehabilitation for injuries he received that day. Hernandez was awarded the Medal of Honor on April 12, 1952.

On December 4, 1950, Lieutenant Thomas Hudner, Jr., crash-landed his aircraft at the Chosin Reservoir, North Korea, in an attempt to save his flight leader, who was trapped in a shot-down plane. On April 13, 1951, Hudner became the first American serviceman in the Korean War to receive the Medal of Honor.

After assuming command of two squads whose leaders were wounded on February 26, 1951, Sgt. Einar Ingman singlehandedly charged and destroyed a machine gun nest

with a grenade before killing the remaining crew by rifle. When a second machine gun opened fire 15 yards away Ingman charged it and was seriously wounded in the face and neck by a hail of fire and grenade fragments — knocking him to the ground. Using only his rifle, he rose to kill the entire gun crew before falling unconscious. As a result, enemy defenses were broken, his squad secured its objective, and more than 100 enemy troops abandoned their weapons and fled. President Harry Truman presented the Medal of Honor to him on July 5, 1951.

Corporal Hiroshi Miyamura covered his unit's retreat during an overwhelming enemy attack near the Imjin River in North Korea on April 24, 1951. After two years of captivity in a Communist prison camp following the attack, Miyamura was repatriated and awarded the Medal of Honor, which was presented to him on October 27, 1953. Corporal Miyamura also fought with George Sakato and the late Senator Daniel Inouye who both received the Medal of Honor for their actions during the Second World War.

On the evening of June 10, 1953 and all through the next day, Sergeant Ola Mize led his men in fierce hand-to-hand combat to repel an overwhelming enemy attack near Surang-ni, South Korea. He was awarded the Medal of Honor on September 7, 1954.

On January 12, 1952, Corporal Ronald Rosser charged up an enemy-held hill near Ponggilli, Korea, single-handedly enabling the withdrawal of his decimated unit. He was awarded the Medal of Honor by President Truman on June 27, 1952.

Corporal Tibor Rubin, a Hungarian-born Holocaust survivor, covered the withdrawal of his unit against a superior enemy force on October 30, 1950, and helped his fellow POWs survive while imprisoned in Korea until 1953. Recommended for the Medal of Honor four times, he finally received it 55 years later in 2005 after a review of Jewish-American veteran military records whose heroism might have been overlooked.

On August 17, 1952, at the Hook near Panmunjom, North Korea, Private First Class Robert Simanek, already injured by an exploding grenade, rolled himself on top of a second grenade thrown into his trench to save the lives of his fellow Marines. On October 27, 1953, Simanek was awarded the Medal of Honor by President Eisenhower.

On November 21–22, 1951, First Lieutenant James Stone repelled multiple enemy attacks in hand-to-hand combat before covering his unit's withdrawal near Sokkogae, North Korea. After 22 months in a prison camp on the Yalu River, Stone was awarded the Medal of Honor on October 27, 1953, just one month after his repatriation.

Despite serious wounds, on October 12, 1952, Private First Class Ernest West fought off enemy forces and evacuated wounded soldiers following an ambush near Sataeri,

Korea. He was awarded the Medal of Honor on January 12, 1954.

Sadly, William R. Charette, James L. Stone, Rodolfo P. Hernandez, and Ola L. Mize died before the stamps could be issued. Their photographs are still included, as they were alive at the time of the stamp proposal.

We hope you use these Medal of Honor stamps when corresponding to loved ones overseas or here at home.

DMM Clarification: Preparing Pallets

Effective July 28, 2014, the Postal Service™ will revise *Mailing Standards of the United States Postal Service*, Domestic Mail Manual (DMM®) section 705.8, Preparing Pallets, to provide a clarification on the alternate sortation of parcels prepared on pallets at Parcel Select® DSCF prices.

DMM 705.8.20.1, Basic Preparation, Parcels on Pallets, states that parcels for each SCF area must be sorted to 5-digit scheme, 5-digit, or 3-digit (nonmachinable) destinations on pallets. When the DMM was revised to include 3-digit nonmachinable destinations for DSCF prices, the word “nonmachinable” was inadvertently omitted from DMM 705.8.20.2, Alternate Preparation, Parcels on Pallets. Therefore, the Postal Service will revise DMM 705.8.20.2, to clarify that parcels prepared on pallets under alternate preparation for Parcel Select DSCF prices be sorted to 3-digit nonmachinable destinations.

DSCF price mailings not prepared under 8.20.1 may be prepared as follows:

[Revise the first sentence of item 705.8.20.2a to read as follows:]

- a. *General.* All DSCF price mail in the mailing must be sorted to 5-digit scheme, 5-digit, or 3-digit (nonmachinable) destinations under 8.20.2 (i.e., mail prepared under 8.20.1 and mail sacked under 255.4.2 must not be included in a mailing prepared under 8.20.2).***

DMM Revision: Domestic Mail Manual Streamlining

Effective July 28, 2014, the Postal Service™ will revise *Mailing Standards of the United States Postal Service*, Domestic Mail Manual (DMM®) parts 203, 601, 608, 703, 705, and 707, as we continue our initiative to reduce the size of the DMM without changes to standards.

Part 203, Basic Postage Statement, Documentation, and Preparation, will be updated to include Periodicals related information.

Part 601, Mailability, will be revised to eliminate redundancy, streamline information, and relocate the hazardous, restricted, and perishable sections. Sections 601.1, General Standards, and 601.2, Bundles, were revised in the June 4, 2014, DMM release. Sections 601.8 through 601.12 will be relocated to various sections in Publication 52, *Hazardous, Restricted, and Perishable Mail*. A new section 601.8 will be added as a high level overview of hazardous,

restricted, and perishable mail and will guide mailers to Publication 52 for the respective mailing standards.

Part 608, Postal Information and Resources, will be revised to streamline information. Specifically, sections 608.3, Post Offices and Holidays, 608.4, Philatelic (Stamp Collecting) Services, 608.5, Private Express Statutes, 608.7, Trademarks and Copyrights of the USPS, and 608.8, USPS Contact Information, will be revised to provide only source references for information on each of these sections.

Part 703, Nonprofit Standard Mail and other Unique Eligibility, will be revised to streamline information. Specifically, sections 703.6, Official Mail (Franked), and 703.7, Official Mail (Penalty), will provide Handbook DM-103, *Official Mail*, as the source reference, and the information from each section will be relocated to Handbook DM-103.

Part 705, Advanced Preparation and Special Postage Payment Systems, will be revised to consolidate, relocate, and streamline information. Section 705.1, Customized MarketMail, will be consolidated into part 201, Physical Standards, and part 240, Standard Mail. In section 705.2, Manifest Mailing System, subsection 705.2.9, the Electronic Verification System will provide RIBBS (<https://ribbs/index.cfm>) and Publication 205, *Electronic Verification System Technical Guide*, as the source reference for information. Section 705.3, Optional Procedure Mailing System, will provide RIBBS and Publication 407, *Optional Procedure (OP) Mailing System*, as the source reference for information. Section 705.22 will be relocated as new section 202.7 to bring it in line with the other items that are located on the face of a mailpiece.

Part 707, Periodicals, has been renumbered as part 207, to bring it in line with the other classes of mail in Chapter

200. We have consolidated information and eliminated redundant language in new part 207 for consistency and to improve flow and ease of use.

Additionally, the applicable Quick Service Guides (QSGs) have been renumbered and updated with new DMM reference information. Applicable Customer Support Rulings have also been updated with new DMM reference information.

To assist in this transition the Postal Service is posting a spreadsheet on Postal Explorer® at <http://pe.usps.com> that will contain a crosswalk for each section of the DMM and renumbering of the QSGs.

- d. The right of the employee or representative to review all material relied upon in the action; and
- e. When, where, and from whom the material is available.

ELM Revision: Pay Administration

Effective July 24, 2014, the Postal Service™ is revising the *Employee and Labor Relations Manual* (ELM) subchapters 410, 430, and 440. These revisions will ensure compliance with laws governing the Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA) and provide guidance to HR professionals within the Postal Service regarding application of internal policy.

417.12 Pay Schedule and Premiums

[Revise the text of 417.12 to read as follows:]

The salary of a career employee who is temporarily assigned to an EAS position is based on the career EAS schedule. However, employees continue to receive pay premiums applicable to their permanently assigned positions while temporarily assigned to EAS positions.

An FLSA-exempt employee who has been temporarily assigned to perform in an FLSA-nonexempt work position for more than 50 percent of the work hours for the week may be eligible for FLSA overtime for hours actually worked over 40 in that FLSA workweek. (See 417.2 for determination of the FLSA status of an employee temporarily assigned to an EAS position.)

[Add new section 417.2 to read as follows:]

417.2 Assigning FLSA Status

It is the policy of the Postal Service that an employee performing work in a position with a different FLSA classification will be classified for FLSA pay purposes as follows:

- a. For an FLSA-exempt employee temporarily assigned to an FLSA-nonexempt position:
 - 1. For the first full pay period of the temporary assignment, the employee's FLSA status remains exempt.
 - 2. For all pay periods beginning after the first full pay period, the employee's FLSA status is changed to

nonexempt and the employee is eligible for FLSA overtime compensation.

Note: PS Form 50, *Notification of Personnel Action*, must be issued when the employee's FLSA status changes to and from FLSA nonexempt status.

- b. An employee whose position of record is nonexempt will not be reclassified as FLSA exempt when temporarily assigned to a position that is classified as FLSA exempt, regardless of the length of the temporary assignment.

- a. The Postmaster’s FLSA regular rate for the week, i.e., straight time pay for the week divided by total hours actually worked in the week (see 443.21), is not less than the FLSA minimum wage.

434.12 Definitions

[Revise the text of 434.12 to read as follows:]

Definitions relevant to overtime are as follows:

- a. *Exempt employees* — employees who are serving in positions that are exempt from and are not covered by the overtime provisions of FLSA because they are paid on a salary basis and are administrative, professional, or executive personnel (see 443.3). These include all employees occupying positions that are classified exempt as indicated in the Organization Management (OM) system position directory.
- b. *Nonexempt employees* — employees who serve in positions that are covered by the overtime provisions of FLSA (see 443.1), namely all those positions that are not classified as exempt in 434.12a. This includes employees serving in nonexempt positions whose rate retention is based on an exempt position.
- c. *Paid hours* — hours actually worked plus paid time off, as defined below:
 - (1) *Hours actually worked* — a time that management suffers or permits an employee to work. The hours actually worked include compensable travel and training time, standby time, or other time on duty. They do not include paid time off as defined below (see also 443.22).
 - (2) *Paid time off* — paid hours of annual leave, sick leave, holiday leave, court leave, military leave, guaranteed time (not worked), and all other paid hours, including personal absences where no work is performed for the Postal Service.

Note: These hours are excluded from the determination of FLSA overtime.

434.13 Types of Compensation

434.131 Postal Overtime

[Revise the text of 434.131 to read as follows:]

Postal overtime is compensation paid pursuant to Postal Service regulations and in accordance with applicable provisions of the collective bargaining agreements to eligible personnel at 150 percent of each employee’s basic hourly rate for actual work hours in excess of 8 paid hours in a day, 40 paid hours in a service week or, if a full-time bargaining unit employee, on a nonscheduled day.

434.132 FLSA Overtime

[Revise the text of 434.132 to read as follows:]

FLSA overtime is compensation paid in accordance with the FLSA overtime requirement described in 443.

434.133 Penalty Overtime

[Revise the text of 434.133 to read as follows:]

Penalty overtime is compensation paid pursuant to Postal Service regulations to eligible personnel at two times the employee’s basic hourly straight-time rate for hours described in applicable labor agreements.

434.134 FLSA Exempt EAS Additional Pay

FLSA-exempt EAS additional pay is compensation directed by Postal Service regulations to be paid to eligible FLSA-exempt employees and is calculated by dividing the annual salary by 2080 and applying this rate to each eligible hour worked.

434.14 Eligibility and Coverage

434.141 Eligible for Overtime Pay

434.142 Multiple Eligibility

[Revise the text of 434.142 to read as follows:]

When an employee is eligible for more than one type of overtime during a service week:

- a. First, penalty overtime is paid for any qualifying hours;
- b. Next, postal overtime is then paid for qualifying hours that are not paid as penalty overtime; and
- c. Then a calculation is made to ensure that at least 150 percent of the employee’s regular hourly rate is paid for all hours worked in excess of 40 at the regular hourly rate in the employee’s FLSA workweek.

434.143 Assignment of FLSA Exempt and Nonexempt Work

[Revise the text of 434.143 to read as follows:]

An FLSA-exempt employee may perform exempt and non-exempt work during a workweek without affecting the employee’s exempt status, provided that the employee’s primary duty, as defined under the FLSA (29 CFR 541 Subpart H), is exempt work.

The amount of time spent performing exempt work is a factor, but not necessarily the determinative factor, in deciding the FLSA classification of an employee. When an exempt employee is regularly assigned to perform nonexempt work for more than 50 percent of his or her workweek, the manager should inform the district Human Resources manager. Human Resources will contact the vice president of Employee Resource Management to request an FLSA status assessment.

434.42 Eligibility

434.421 Eligibility for Holiday Leave Pay

[Revise second and third paragraph of 434.421 to read as follows:]

To receive holiday leave pay, employees must be in a pay status either the last scheduled hour before or the first scheduled hour after the holiday or designated holiday.

However, for an employee on any form of extended LWOP, paid leave for the last scheduled hour before or the first scheduled hour after the holiday or designated holiday is not approved for the purpose of qualifying the employee for holiday pay.

438.16 Effect on Other Travel Reimbursement

[Revise the text of 438.16 to read as follows:]

The rules stated in 438.1, Pay During Travel, do not affect the entitlement of employees to other types of reimbursement under applicable regulations, such as reimbursement of certain travel expenses and per diem.

441.1 Federal Statute

[Revise the text of 441.1 to read as follows:]

The Fair Labor Standards Act (FLSA), as amended, applies to the Postal Service. It is the policy of the Postal Service to comply with the FLSA. This section provides a summary of the FLSA and is intended to assist Postal Service personnel in complying with the law. To the extent that any provision in ELM 440 appears to be inconsistent with or provide greater or lesser rights or benefits than provided under the FLSA, the provisions of the FLSA and FLSA regulations are controlling.

441.2 Enforcement

[Revise the text of 441.2 to read as follows:]

The FLSA authorizes the Department of Labor (DOL) to: (a) enforce compliance with the FLSA; (b) investigate allegations of noncompliance with the FLSA; and (c) supervise the payment of unpaid wages or unpaid overtime compensation owed to an employee because of noncompliance. The law also provides for enforcement by private suit in the courts.

[Delete 442, 442.1, and 442.2 in their entirety, renumber 442.3 to 441.3 and revise the text of 441.3 to read as follows:]

441.3 FLSA Poster

All Postal Service facilities are required to conspicuously display the current FLSA poster authorized by the DOL.

[Renumber 443 as 442 as follows:]

442 Equal Pay Provisions

[Renumber 443.1 as 442.1 and revise the text to read as follows:]

442.1 Sex Discrimination Policy

The FLSA (as amended by the Equal Pay Act), Section 6(d)(1), prohibits pay discrimination on the basis of sex. Employees, regardless of their sex, must receive equal wages for equal work on jobs which require equal skill, effort, and responsibility and are performed under similar working conditions.

[Renumber 443.2 as 442.2 and revise the text to read as follows:]

442.2 Justified Wage Differentials

Wage differentials do not violate the FLSA if they are based on: (a) a seniority system; (b) a merit system; (c) a system that measures earnings by quantity of production; or (d) any factor other than sex.

[Renumber 443.3 as 442.3 and revise the text to read as follows:]

442.3 Labor Organization Intervention

It is illegal for a labor organization to cause or attempt to cause an employer to discriminate against an employee in violation of the Equal Pay Act.

[Delete 443.4 in its entirety and renumber 444 as 443 as follows:]

443 Overtime Pay

[Renumber 444.1 as 443.1 and revise the title and text to read as follows:]

443.1 Overtime Requirement

The FLSA provides that the Postal Service must pay an employee covered by the overtime provisions of the Act

(also known as an FLSA-nonexempt employee) at one and one-half times the employee's *regular rate* for all hours of *actual work* in excess of 40 hours in any FLSA *work week*. (See 444 for special provisions covering rural letter carriers.)

[Renumber 444.2 and 444.21 as 443.2 and 443.21 as follows:]

443.2 Explanation of Terms

443.21 Regular Rate

[Renumber 444.211 as 443.211 and revise the title and text to read as follows:]

443.211 Definitions

- a. *Salaried Employee.* An employee's *regular rate of pay* is defined as *the remuneration for employment* received during an FLSA workweek, as specified in 443.212, divided by the hours that the employee actually worked.
- b. *Hourly Rate Employee.* The *regular rate* of an employee who is paid a fixed hourly wage is defined as *the remuneration for employment* received, as specified in 443.212.

[Renumber 444.212 as 443.212 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.212 Inclusions

Remuneration for employment includes:

- a. Total base straight-time pay, including COLA, for work performed.
- b. Total straight-time pay differential for higher level work performed.
- * * * * *
- f. Total base straight-time pay, including COLA, for work performed on a holiday.
- g. Total base straight-time pay, including COLA, of a city letter carrier covering those hours not worked between the seventh and eighth hour of a regular scheduled day (7:01 rule). See 432.53.
- * * * * *
- k. Total straight-time pay during scheduled tour and/or scheduled overtime spent waiting for or receiving medical attention (see 432.72).
- * * * * *

[Renumber 444.213 as 443.213 and revise the first sentence, 443.213a and 443.213b to read as follows:]

443.213 Exclusions

Remuneration for employment excludes:

- a. Pay for time not worked, such as annual leave, sick leave, holiday leave, and guaranteed time not worked.
- b. The 50 percent overtime pay premium for time in pay status in excess of 8 hours in a day or 40 hours in a week.

* * * * *

[Renumber 444.214 as 443.214 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.214 Exclusions Not Creditable

The exclusions listed in 443.213a, f, g, and i are not creditable toward FLSA overtime compensation that is due to an employee.

[Renumber 444.215 as 443.215 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.215 Dual Employment Rate

When an employee in a single service week works in two or more positions having different rates of pay, the regular rate for the week equals the total base straight-time pay for actual work performed, plus all other remuneration for actual work performed, divided by the hours worked.

[Renumber 444.22 as 443.22 as follows:]

443.22 Actual Work

[Renumber 444.221 as 443.221 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.221 Definition

The FLSA defines *actual work* as all time which management suffers or permits an employee to work.

[Renumber 444.222 as 443.222 as follows:]

443.222 Exclusions

[Renumber 444.223 as 443.223 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.223 Unauthorized Time

An employee must be paid for all work performed, regardless of whether the supervisor approved or disapproved the employee's continuing to work. It is the duty of supervisors to exercise control over the working hours of their subordinates by making sure that employees complete their duties and clock out promptly at the completion of their tour if additional work is not desired or authorized. (See 432.7 for disallowed time.)

[Renumber 444.23 as 443.23, revise the title and add text to read as follows:]

443.23 FLSA Workweek

See 432.42, Service Week.

[Renumber 444.231 as 443.231 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.231 Explanation

The FLSA workweek for all employees is a fixed and regular recurring period of 168 hours — 7 consecutive 24-hour periods. Once the beginning time of an employee's workweek is established, it remains fixed regardless of the schedule of hours worked. The beginning of the FLSA workweek may be changed only if the change is intended to be permanent and is not designed to evade the payment of overtime.

[Renumber 444.232 as 443.232 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.232 Permanent Change

When there is a permanent change in an employee's workweek which causes some of the working time to fall within hours that are included in both the *old* and *new* workweek, the employee's pay is calculated as follows:

- a. First, assume that the overlapping hours are to be counted as hours worked only in the *old* workweek and not in the *new*; compute straight-time and overtime compensation due for each of the 2 workweeks on this basis and total the two sums.
- b. Next, assume that the overlapping hours are to be counted as hours worked only within the *new* workweek and not in the *old*; complete the total computation accordingly.
- c. Then, pay the employee an amount not less than the greater of the amounts computed by methods *a* and *b* above.

[Renumber 444.233 as 443.233 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.233 Full-time Employees

The FLSA workweek for full-time employees is 168 consecutive hours established as follows;

- a. For an employee whose regular schedule includes Saturday as a service day, the FLSA workweek begins 8 hours prior to the beginning of the employee's regular schedule for that service day.

Example 1: Full-time Employee A has a regular schedule starting time of 11:00 P.M. Friday night. By definition, the employee's Postal Service workday is Saturday. Based on the FLSA workweek definition, the employee's FLSA workweek begins at 3:00 P.M. Friday.

Example 2: Full-time Employee B has a regular schedule starting time of 1:00 A.M. Saturday. By definition, the employee's Postal Service workday is Saturday. Based on the FLSA workweek definition

contained in 443.231, the employee's FLSA workweek in this situation begins at 5:00 P.M. Friday.

- b. For an employee whose regular schedule does not include Saturday as a service day, the FLSA workweek is established by considering Saturday as if it were a service day in the workweek with the employee's regularly scheduled starting time. Thus, the employee's FLSA workweek begins 8 hours prior to this Saturday service day starting time.

Example 3: Full-time Employee C has Saturdays and Sundays off and her first scheduled workday is Monday at 6:00 A.M. For purposes of establishing the FLSA workweek, 6:00 A.M. is considered as a Saturday service day starting time. Based on the FLSA workweek definition above, the employee's FLSA workweek begins at 10:00 P.M. Friday.

[Renumber 444.234 as 443.234 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.234 Part-time Employees

The FLSA workweek for part-time employees is 168 consecutive hours established as follows:

- a. The employee's normal starting time, as established by the installation head (for a part-time regular, this is his or her regularly scheduled starting time), is used as the basis for establishing the FLSA workweek by considering such starting time as if it were a Saturday service day starting time. The beginning of the FLSA workweek is 8 hours prior to this Saturday service day starting time, *but in no case does it begin prior to 8:00 P.M. Friday.*

Example 1: Part-time flexible Employee E normally reports to his pay location at 11:00 P.M. For purposes of establishing the FLSA workweek, the 11:00 P.M. starting time is considered a Saturday service day starting time, i.e., 11:00 P.M. Friday night. When the above FLSA workweek definition is applied, the employee's FLSA workweek begins at 8:00 P.M. Friday.

Example 2: Part-time flexible Employee F normally reports to her pay location at 3:00 P.M. For purposes of establishing the FLSA workweek, the 3:00 P.M. starting time is considered a Saturday service day starting time. Applying the above FLSA workweek definition, the employee's FLSA workweek begins at 7:00 A.M. Saturday.

Example 3: Part-time regular Employee G is regularly scheduled to report to his pay location at 6:00 P.M. For purposes of establishing the FLSA workweek, the 6:00 P.M. starting time is considered a Saturday service day starting time. Applying the above FLSA

workweek definition, the employee's FLSA workweek begins at 10:00 A.M. Saturday.

[Renumber 444.3 and 444.31 as 443.3 and 443.31 as follows:]

443.3 Exemptions

443.31 Policy

[Renumber 444.311 as 443.311 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.311 General

The FLSA exempts from its overtime provisions any employee whose work qualifies the employee as a bona fide *executive, administrative, professional, outside sales, computer, or highly compensated employee*. The Postal Service applies these classifications consistently, according to the requirements set forth in the FLSA and FLSA regulations.

[Renumber 444.312 as 443.312 and revise the text to read as follows:]

443.312 Postal Service Administration

FLSA classification determinations are made by the office of Organizational Effectiveness.

[Delete sections 444.313, 444.32, 444.321, 444.322, 444.323, and 444.324 in their entirety.]

[Renumber 445, 445.1, and 445.11 as 444, 444.1, and 444.11 as follows:]

444 Rural Letter Carrier Compensation

444.1 Regular Rural Carriers

444.11 Guaranteed Annual Wage

* * * * *

[Renumber 445.12 as 444.12 and revise the second sentence to read as follows:]

444.12 Base Rate of Pay

***Hours worked in excess of 12 hours a day, or 56 hours in an FLSA workweek, are payable at 150 percent of the carrier's regular rate.

[Renumber 445.2 as 444.2 and revise the text to read as follows:]

444.2 Other Rural Carriers

Rural carriers who are not covered under the guarantee provisions of Section 7(b)(2) of the FLSA are compensated at the rate for a 40-mile route in accordance with the compensation provisions in 433 and 434.

[Renumber 446 as 445 as follows:]

445 Compliance Investigations

[Renumber 446.1 as 445.1 and revise the text to read as follows:]

445.1 DOL On-site Visit

If a properly identified DOL Wage and Hour Inspector visits a postal facility, the following should be noted:

- a. The FLSA requires that records regarding pay, hours worked, and related data be open at any time for review by DOL Wage and Hour Inspectors.
- b. All site visits or inquiries by a DOL Wage and Hour Inspector must be reported immediately to the district Human Resources manager.
- c. The district Human Resources manager must contact the area law office when informed that a DOL Wage and Hour Inspector is conducting an audit.
- d. The installation head (or designee) is expected to be cooperative. After consulting with the district Human Resources manager, he or she should answer all specific and reasonable questions related to pay practices in the facility and provide the pertinent data requested.
- e. Requests for general information or data that is not available at the installation should be referred to the district Human Resources manager.

[Renumber 446.2 as 445.2 and revise the text to read as follows:]

445.2 DOL Findings

Ask DOL Inspectors to provide a written report of any informal allegation of FLSA violations and investigative findings to the district Human Resources manager and the installation head (or designee).

[Renumber 446.3 as 445.3 and revise the text to read as follows:]

445.3 Postal Service Actions

Upon receipt of the FLSA report:

- a. The installation head should forward comments and recommendations related to the allegations and findings to the district Human Resources manager.
- b. The district Human Resources manager should send copies of investigative reports and all related correspondence to Headquarters Compensation and the area law office.

In accordance with the Donovan vs. Postal Service settlement agreement, the Postal Service will be afforded the opportunity to rectify an FLSA violation prior to the filing of any complaint or other formal enforcement action by DOL.

Note: The installation head does not have the authority and cannot agree to any proposed remedial measure prior to consulting with the district Human Resources manager, Headquarters Compensation, and the Law Department.

IMM Revision: Size and Weight Limits for Australia

Effective September 7, 2014, the Postal Service™ will revise *Mailing Standards of the United States Postal Service*, International Mail Manual (IMM®) to reflect changes to the size and weight limits for Priority Mail Express International® and Priority Mail International® services for Australia as follows:

- *Priority Mail Express International:* The size limit increases to a maximum length and girth combined of 97 inches, and the maximum weight limit increases to 66 pounds. Previously, the maximum length and girth combined was 79 inches and the maximum weight was 44 pounds. The maximum length of 36 inches remains the same.

- *Priority Mail International:* The size limit increases to a maximum length and girth combined of 97 inches. Previously, the maximum length and girth combined was 79 inches. The maximum length of 42 inches and the maximum weight limit of 66 pounds remain the same.

IMM Revision: Individual Country Listings for Australia, Moldova, and Ukraine

Effective September 7, 2014, the Postal Service™ will revise *Mailing Standards of the United States Postal Service*, International Mail Manual (IMM®) to reflect changes to the Individual Country Listings (ICLs) for Australia, Moldova, and Ukraine.

The following ICL changes are a result of formal requests made through the Universal Postal Union (UPU) via International Bureau Circulars (IBC):

- Australia: As indicated in UPU IBC 111, dated June 30, 2014, Australia is prohibiting most food, plant, and animal products, including the use of products such as straw and other plant material as packing materials.

- Moldova: As indicated in UPU IBC 94, dated June 2, 2014, Moldova is prohibiting items containing software or technical devices specifically developed, manufactured, programmed, or adapted to intercept information. Additionally, Moldova is adding a new observation stating that valuable articles should be sent as insured mail.
- Ukraine: As indicated in UPU IBC 91, dated May 26, 2014, Ukraine is revising its observation regarding goods sent by Priority Mail Express International® service — such a mailing will be subject to an import duty and value-added tax when its total invoiced customs value exceeds 150 EUR (reduced

from the previous value of 300 EUR). However, the exemption from customs fees for goods up to 150 EUR does not apply if the goods are subject to excise duties.

Verifying U.S. Postal Service Money Orders

Follow these steps to cash a Postal Service™ money order:

1. Check that the amount does not exceed the legal limit: \$1,000 for domestic, and \$700 for international postal money orders.
2. Check that the proper security features are present:
 - When held to the light, a watermark of Benjamin Franklin is repeated from top to bottom on the left side.
 - When held to the light, a dark line (security thread) runs from top to bottom with the word “USPS” repeated.
 - There should be no discoloration around the dollar amounts, which might indicate the amounts were changes.

These appear in Postal Service Notice 299, *U.S. Postal Money Order Reference Card*, or online at <https://www.usps.com/shop/accepting-money-orders.htm>.

3. If the money order seems suspicious, call the U.S. Postal Service Money Order Verification System at 866-459-7822.

Note: Mail order catalogs are prohibited as SAM or PAL mail.

A. Securities, currency, or precious metals in their raw, unmanufactured state are prohibited. Official shipments are exempt from this restriction.

A1. Mail addressed to "Any Servicemember," or similar wording such as "Any Soldier," "Sailor," "Airman," or "Marine"; "Military Mail"; etc., is prohibited. Mail must be addressed to an individual or job title such as "Commander," "Commanding Officer," etc.

A2. APO/FPO/DPO addresses shall not include a city and/or country name.

B. Regardless of mail class, a customs declaration (PS Form 2976 or, if the customer prefers, PS Form 2976-A) is required for all items weighing 16 ounces or more or any item (regardless of weight) containing potentially dutiable mail contents (e.g., merchandise or goods) addressed to or from an APO, FPO, or DPO ZIP Code. No customs form is required for items weighing less than 16 ounces when the contents are not potentially dutiable (e.g., documents). The surface area of the address side of the mailpiece must be large enough to contain the applicable customs declaration. The following exceptions apply:

- Known mailers are exempt from providing customs documentation on non-dutiable letters or printed matter. (A known mailer is a business mailer who enters volume mailings through a business mail entry unit (BMEU) or other bulk mail acceptance location, pays postage through an advance deposit account, uses a permit imprint for postage payment, and submits a completed postage statement at the time of entry that certifies that the mailpieces contain no dangerous materials that are prohibited by postal regulations.)
- All federal, state, and local government agencies whose mailings are regarded as "Official Mail" are exempt from providing customs documentation on any item addressed to an APO, FPO, or DPO except for those APOs/FPOs/DPOs to which restriction "B2" applies.
- Prepaid mail from military contractors is exempt, providing the mailpiece is endorsed "Contents for Official Use — Exempt from Customs Requirements."

B2. All federal, state, and local government agencies must complete customs documentation when sending potentially dutiable mail addressed to or from this APO, FPO, or DPO.

C. Cigarettes and other tobacco products are prohibited.

C1. Obscene articles, prints, paintings, cards, films, videotapes, etc., and horror comics and matrices are prohibited.

D. Coffee is prohibited.

E. Medicines (prescription, over-the-counter, vitamins, and supplements) are prohibited when mailed to individuals for human or animal use. This prohibition does not apply when medicines are sent as official mail only between specifically designated agencies such as pharmaceutical distributors, hospitals, clinics, and pharmacies.

E1. Medicines or vaccines not conforming to French laws are prohibited.

E2. Any matter depicting nude or seminude persons, pornographic or sexual items, or nonauthorized political materials is prohibited. Although religious materials contrary to the Islamic faith are prohibited in bulk quantities, items for the personal use of the addressee are permissible.

E3. Radio transceivers, cordless telephones, global positioning systems, scanners, base stations, and handheld transmitters are prohibited.

F. Firearms of any type are prohibited in all classes of mail. See definitions of firearms in DMM 601.12.1.1. This restriction does not apply to firearms mailed to or by official U.S. government agencies. The restriction for mail to this APO/FPO/DPO ZIP Code does not apply to firearms mailed from this APO/FPO/DPO ZIP Code, provided ATF and USPS regulations are met. Antique firearms are a separate category defined in DMM 601.12.1.1h and ATF regulations; they do not require an ATF form.

F1. Privately owned weapons addressed to an individual are prohibited in any class of mail.

F2. Importation of firearms is restricted to one shotgun and one single shot.22 caliber rifle per individual.

G. Only letters, flats, and Periodicals are authorized. Parcels of any class are prohibited.

H. Meats, including preserved meats, whether hermetically sealed or not, are prohibited.

H1. Pork or pork by-products are prohibited.

I. Mail of all classes must fit in a mail sack. Mail may not exceed the following dimensions:

- Maximum length 20 inches.
- Maximum width 12 inches.
- Maximum height 12 inches.

The maximum length and girth combined may not exceed 68 inches.

This restriction does not apply to registered mail and official government mail marked MOM.

I1. This restriction does not apply to registered mail.

I2. This restriction does not apply to official government mail marked MOM.

J. Parcels may not exceed 108 inches in length and girth combined.

K. Mail that includes in the address the words, "Dependent Mail Section," may consist only of letter mail, newspapers, magazines, and books. No parcel of any class containing any other matter may be mailed to the Dependent Mail section. This restriction does not apply if the address does not include the words "Dependent Mail Section."

L. All official mail is prohibited.

M. Fruits, vegetables, animals, and living plants are prohibited.

N. Registered mail is prohibited.

O. Delivery status information for Extra Services is not available on USPS.com.

P. APO is used for the receipt and dispatch of official mail only.

Q. Mail may not exceed 66 pounds, and size is limited to 42 inches maximum length and 72 inches maximum length and girth combined.

R. All alcoholic beverages, including those mailable under DMM 601.12.7, are prohibited.

R1. Materials used in the production of alcoholic beverages (i.e., distilling material, hops, malts, yeast, etc.) are prohibited.

S. Mail of all classes must fit in a mail sack. Mail may not exceed the following dimensions and weight:

- Maximum length 12 inches.
- Maximum width 12 inches.
- Maximum height 5 1/2 inches.
- Maximum weight 25 pounds.

The maximum length and girth combined may not exceed 47 inches.

T. Mailings of case lots of food and supplemental household shipments must be approved by the sender's parent agency prior to mailing.

U. Parcels must weigh less than 16 ounces when addressed to Box R. This restriction does not apply to mail endorsed "Free Matter for the Blind or Handicapped."

U1. Mail is limited to First-Class Mail weighing 13 ounces or less when addressed to Box R. This restriction does not apply to mail endorsed "Free Matter for the Blind or Handicapped." Videotapes are prohibited when addressed to Box R, regardless of weight.

U2. Mail is limited to First-Class Mail letters only when addressed to Box R.

U3. Mail is limited to First-Class Mail correspondence (including voice and video cassettes), newspapers, magazines, photographs, not exceeding 16 ounces, when addressed to Box R.

U4. Mail addressed to Box C is limited to 2 pounds, regardless of class.

V. Express Mail Military Service (EMMS) not available from any origin.

V1. USPS Tracking is not available.

W. Meat products, such as dried beef, salami, and sausage, may be mailed, provided they remain in their original, hermetically sealed packages and bear USDA certification. Other meats, bones, skin, hair, feathers, horns or hoofs of hoofed animals, wool samples, tobacco leaves, including chewing and pipe tobacco, snuff, cigars, and cigarettes, or obscene material, including obscene drawings, photographs, films, and carvings, are prohibited. Exception: 200 grams of tobacco per parcel are permitted duty free.

X. Personal mail is limited to First-Class Mail items (to include audio cassettes and voice tapes) weighing 13 ounces or less. This limitation does not apply to official mail.

Y. Mail is limited to First-Class and Priority Mail items only. All Periodicals, Standard Mail items, and Package Services items (including SAM and PAL) are not authorized. This restriction also applies to official mail.

Z. No outside pieces (OSPs).

Z1. The following restriction is applicable only to International Service Centers (ISC)/Exchange Offices. An Anti-Pilferage Seal (Item No O817E or O818A) is required on all pouches and sacks.

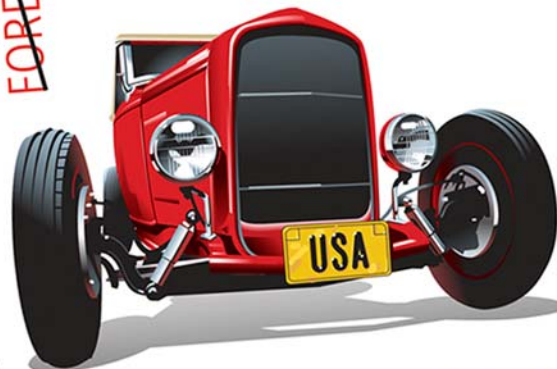

The G Fund is managed internally by the Federal Retirement Thrift Investment Board. Assets of the F, C, S, and I Funds are managed externally. The Board currently has contracts with BlackRock Institutional Trust Company, N.A., to manage the F, C, S, and I Fund assets. The F, C, S, and I Funds invest in commingled trust funds, in which the assets of tax-deferred employee benefit plans are combined and invested together. The F, C, S, and I Funds and the BlackRock funds are passively managed index funds.

Future performance of the funds will vary and may be significantly different from the returns shown above. See the *Summary of the Thrift Savings Plan* for detailed information about the funds and their investment risks. The monthly returns of the TSP Funds represent net earnings for the month after deduction of accrued administrative expenses and, except for the G Fund, after deduction of trading costs and accrued investment management fees as well. Handbook AS-353 Revision: Privacy Act Systems of Records

Effective July 24, 2014, the Postal Service™ is revising Handbook AS-353, *Guide to Privacy, The Freedom of Information Act, and Records Management*, to include modifications which were published in the *Federal Register* on April 11, 2014 (79 FR 20249–20250).

The Postal Service implemented a new, complex self-service password to replace the existing self-service PIN. Previously, Postal Service employees would use their Postal Service-issued Employee Identification Number (EIN) and personal identification number (PIN) to access data pertaining to them in postal information systems, such as PostalEASE, LiteBlue, and other sites that require EINs and PINs to access. The system of records 500.000, Property Management Records, is being modified to account for the collection of an employee’s challenge questions, challenge answers, and optionally, email addresses in the new Self-Service Profile application. These changes were made to improve the protection of employee privacy by strengthening the authentication process for accessing postal information systems.

Effective July 24, 2014, the Postal Service™ is issuing Management Instruction (MI) FM-640-2014-4, *Government-Issued, Individually Billed Travel Charge Cards*, to reflect the elimination of cash advances for bargaining unit employees utilizing the cash withdrawal feature of the government-issued, individually billed travel cards. This change will not affect any of the other features of the travel card or the ability to pay for official travel-related expenses.

You are reminded that the government-issued, individually billed travel cards are issued to employees to use for official USPS® travel-related expenses ONLY.

Fiscal Year 2014 Closing Guidance: Message From the Controller

Thanks to all of you for your efforts to control expenses during FY 2014. It is important that we carry this effort through to the end of the fiscal year by controlling discretionary activity. This does not mean curtailing business, but it does mean making prudent choices by deferring or eliminating noncritical activity, and purchasing goods or services throughout the year, rather than at the end of the fiscal year, simply because there are available budget funds. Please encourage your contractors to bill us in a timely manner for goods received and services rendered, so we can recognize the expense before the end of the fiscal year.

The following instructions will assist you, when appropriate, in helping the Postal Service™ close its financial books in a timely and efficient manner.

I. Instructions for Fiscal Year 2014 Closing

All organizations are requested to limit their expenditures to essential spending. Accordingly, all vice presidents should review discretionary spending to ensure the Postal Service attains its financial target for this fiscal year (FY).

The instruction and reporting dates in this *Postal Bulletin* supplement procedures followed during the normal monthly or quarterly reporting schedule.

II. Fiscal Year

The Postal Service prepares its annual reports on a government FY basis, which comprises 365 days (366 in leap years), always ending on September 30.

III. End of Year Processing Activities and Timelines, Contract Actions, and Requisitions

Expense requisitions and requests for contract modifications for FY14 should be submitted to Supply Management before August 31. Requisitions for capital purchases will be accepted by Supply Management through September 12.

Also, organizations should limit capital commitments, particularly for Postal Service support equipment, to essential needs. The schedule for Supply Management processing is as follows:

For requisitions received...	Funds are processed as follows...
On or before August 31, 2014	Supply Management will issue the required contract or modification for Accounting Services, San Mateo to process against FY 2014 funds.

For requisitions received...	Funds are processed as follows...
On or after September 1, 2014	Supply Management will issue the required contract or modification for Accounting Services, San Mateo to process against FY 2015 funds.

Requisitions for Contract Actions

FY 2014, Expense and Capital requisitions and requests for contract action should be submitted to Supply Management before August 31 and September 12, 2014, respectively.

Requisitions for IT Hardware, Services, Software, and Telecom (Exception):

For FY 2014, Expense and Capital requisition requests for contract actions should be submitted to Supply Management before August 1, 2014. Any requests received after this date will not be guaranteed for award and delivery by September 30, 2014.

For FY 2014, Expense and Capital requisition requests for contract actions that require a start date of October 1, 2014, should be submitted to Supply Management before August 1, 2014. Any requests received after this date will not be guaranteed for award by October 1, 2014.

Hardcopy paper commitment documents (only applies to Non-CAMS documents) must be forwarded to Accounting Services, San Mateo, no later than Friday, September 19. Electronic files must be transmitted to Accounting Services as follows:

Contract Authoring and Management System (CAMS)	San Mateo	September 30, 2014
Facilities capital commitments and expense payments	St. Louis	September 30, 2014

Appropriate receiving reports or certified invoices for goods and services received by September 30 must be received by Accounting Services, San Mateo, no later than Wednesday, October 1.

1. Expedite processing of receiving reports and certified invoices, as these documents are used to charge expense to the proper FY.

2. Additionally, review contracts to ensure sufficient funds are available by Friday, August 29 to process invoices.

3. Supply Management will process all requisitions for the issuance of contracts against FY 2014 funds according to the following priorities:

Priority 1 — Capital commitment requisitions.

Priority 2 — Expense commitment requisitions.

IV. Accruals

Year-end closing, FY 2014:

1. There will be no “special” end-of-year accruals for HQ expenses. Monthly accruals for HQ expenses will be processed as normal and as communicated to the Executive Leadership Team (ELT) budget coordinators.
Note: Any unusual/non-monthly expense should be

communicated to the ELT as a possible adjustment to the normal ELT accrual.

2. All HQ accruals will be accrued at the ELT finance level.
3. All invoices for San Mateo goods and services received in the month of September must be mailed to San Mateo no later than September 26 for processing by September 30, 2014. All invoices not received by San Mateo by October 1, 2014, will be processed in October 2014, and charged to FY 2015.

Stamp Announcement 14-35: Janis Joplin Stamp

On August 8, 2014, in San Francisco, CA, the U.S. Postal Service® will issue the *Janis Joplin* stamp (Forever® First-Class Mail priced at 49 cents) in one design, in a pressure-sensitive adhesive (PSA) pane of 16 stamps (Item 588100). This item will only be sold in full format, as a pane of 16.

The stamp will go on sale nationwide August 8, 2014.

The fifth issuance in the *Music Icons* series features Janis Joplin, a groundbreaking singer, whose powerful bluesy voice propelled her to the pinnacle of rock stardom. The artwork for this stamp features a photo of Janis Joplin taken by David Gahr in June 1970. The original black-and-white photo is rendered in shades of blue, with Joplin’s trademark round sunglasses tinted a shade of pink. The words “Janis Joplin,” along with the “Forever” denomination and “USA” appear in psychedelic-style script reminiscent of the 1960s, in shades of gold, orange, and pink. Daniel Pelavin designed the lettering. Text below the stamps briefly describes Joplin’s musical legacy. The flip side of the stamp pane, designed to resemble a vintage 45 rpm record sleeve, features a photograph of Joplin taken by Bruce Steinberg in May 1968 at the First International San Jose Pop Festival. The image is accompanied by the words “Janis Joplin Blues Rock Country Soul Folk,” in psychedelic-style lettering. Art director Antonio Alcalá designed the stamp and the stamp pane.

No merchandise allowed — only HQ pre-approved philatelic products allowed. The following credit is required: Janis Joplin is a TM of Fantality Corp.

The Binghamton, Dulles, and Kansas City Stamp Distribution Centers (SDCs) will receive an automatic distribution quantity for a PSA pane of 16 stamps. Distributions are rounded up to the nearest master carton size of 2,000 panes (32,000 stamps). The stamps will be shipped and sold as a pane of 16 (\$7.84).

Guidelines for Finalizing the Janis Joplin Stamp Pictorial Postmark Art



To finalize the *Janis Joplin* stamp pictorial postmark art, insert the date, city, state and ZIP™ Code of the physical location of your event adjacent to the stamp image. Overall dimensions of the pictorial postmark must not exceed 4 inches horizontally by 2 inches vertically. Collectors prefer the dimensions 3-1/2 inches by 1.

The Postal Service must make all special postmarks known to collectors through advance publicity in the Postal Bulletin. Therefore, all special dedication cancellations must be reported to Stamp Services four weeks before the events using PS Form 413, *Pictorial Postmark Announcement/Report*. On August 21, 2014, in Hartford, CT, the U.S. Postal Service® will issue the *Hudson River School* stamps (Forever® First-Class Mail priced at 49 cents), in four designs, in a pressure-sensitive adhesive (PSA) pane of 20 stamps (Item 689500).

The stamps will go on sale nationwide August 21, 2014.

This 12th issuance in the *American Treasures* series features details of paintings by four renowned artists of the Hudson River School. Inspired by the stunning natural beauty of New York state, this loose-knit school of painters flourished from the mid-1830s to the mid-1870s and gave America its first major school of art. The paintings on these stamps are: *Distant View of Niagara Falls* by Thomas Cole (1801–1848); *Summer Afternoon* by Asher B. Durand (1796–1886); *Sunset* by Frederic Edwin Church (1826–1900); and *Grand Canyon* by Thomas Moran (1837–1926). The designer and art director for these stamps was Derry Noyes.

Each one of the Hudson River School stamps must be shown in its entirety with the perforations. None of the stamps may be cropped or modified in any way and must be used only as a whole image.

The Binghamton, Dulles, and Kansas City Stamp Distribution Centers (SDCs) will receive an automatic distribution quantity for a double-sided booklet of 20 stamps. Distributions are rounded up to the nearest master carton size of 4,000 stamps.

Initial Supply to Post Offices

Stamp Fulfillment Services will make a subsequent automatic push distribution to Post Offices™ of a quantity to cover approximately 30 days of sales.

For Offices Using SEAM

Offices that are still in SEAM will find automatic push distribution information posted, by finance number and unit ID, on the Asset Management SDC webpage at http://blue.usps.gov/purchase/assetmgnt/am_sdchome.htm. Post Offices may preorder these stamps prior to FDOI through the eBuy2 SEAM Catalog. However, offices should check the website noted above to determine the amount they will receive on their automatic push distribution.

Pictorial Postmarks Announcement

As a community service, the Postal Service™ offers pictorial postmarks to commemorate local events celebrated in communities throughout the nation. A list of events for which pictorial postmarks are authorized appears below. The sponsor of the pictorial postmark appears in italics under the date. Also provided are illustrations of these postmarks.

People attending these local events may obtain the postmark in person at the temporary Post Office™ station established there. Those who cannot attend the event but who wish to obtain the postmark may submit a mail order request. Pictorial postmarks are available only for the dates indicated, and *requests must be postmarked no later than 30 days following the requested pictorial postmark date.*

All requests must include a stamped envelope or postcard bearing at least the minimum First-Class Mail® postage. Items submitted for postmark may not include postage issued after the date of the requested postmark. Such items will be returned unserved.

Customers wishing to obtain a postmark should affix stamps to any envelope or postcard of their choice, address the envelope or postcard to themselves or others, insert a card of postcard thickness in envelopes for sturdiness, and tuck in the flap. Place the envelope or postcard

in a larger envelope and address it to: Pictorial Postmarks, followed by the Name of the Station, Address, City, State, ZIP+4® Code, as listed below.

Customers can also send stamped envelopes and postcards without addresses for postmark, as long as they supply a larger envelope with adequate postage and their return address. After applying the pictorial postmark, the Postal Service returns the items (with or without addresses) under addressed protective cover.

How to Order the First-Day-of-Issue Digital Color or Traditional Postmarks

Customers have 60 days to obtain the first-day-of-issue postmarks by mail. They may purchase new stamps at their local Post Office™, by telephone at 800-STAMP-24, or at The Postal Store® website at www.usps.com/shop.

Traditional Postmarks

Customers should affix the stamps to envelopes of their choice, address them to themselves or others, or provide a self-addressed return envelope with sufficient postage large enough to accommodate the canceled item. Mail the request to the corresponding city of issuance. There is no charge for the first 50 postmarks. There is a 5-cent charge for each additional postmark over 50. Customers should submit a check, money order, or credit card for payment. After applying the first-day-of-issue postmark, the Postal Service™ will return the envelopes to the customer by U.S. Mail.

All postmark requests should go to the first-day-of-issue city. The first-day-of-issue city Post Office will then forward in bulk all postmark requests to Cancellation Services, Stamp Fulfillment Services, PO Box 449992, Kansas City, MO 64144-9992 by respective Post Offices.

Digital Color Postmarks

Only select stamp issues offer a digital color postmark. Customers may submit #6 or #10 envelopes constructed of paper rated as "laser safe." The Postal Service recommends envelopes of 80-pound Accent Opaque, acid-free, 9/16" side seams with no glue on the flap. The maximum

size of all digital color postmarks is 2" high x 4" long. Allow sufficient space on the envelope to accommodate the postmark. Do not use self-adhesive labels for addresses on the envelope. Two test envelopes must be included. There is a minimum of 10 envelopes at 50 cents per postmark required at the time of servicing. Customers should submit a check, money order, or credit card for payment.

The Postal Service reserves the right to not accept hand-painted and other cachet envelopes that are not compatible with our digital color postmark equipment. The Postal Service also reserves the right to substitute traditional black rubber postmarks if use of nonspecified envelopes results in poor image quality or damage to equipment.

Customers should affix the stamps to the envelopes and address them to themselves or others for return through the mail. Or, they may include an additional self-addressed return envelope, large enough to accommodate their canceled items, with sufficient postage affixed for return of their postmarked items. Mail the request for a first-day-of-issue digital color postmark to the corresponding city of issuance. Post Offices will then forward all customer requests for digital color postmarks to Cancellation Services, Stamp Fulfillment Services, PO Box 449992, Kansas City, MO 64144-9992.

After applying the first-day-of-issue postmark, the Postal Service will return the envelopes to the customer by U.S. Mail.
